**Academic Senate Attendance:** Attendance at Academic Senate meetings is important for many reasons. Senators represent their Division at Senate Meetings, provide a means of communication between Senate and the faculty, and participate in the work of the Senate as an officer or committee member.

SBVC Academic Senate By-Laws address senator attendance and replacement in by-laws 139-141 cited below. In summary, a Senator must attend 5 out of every 9 meetings (56%). According to the Academic Senate Attendance Record it can be projected that the following Divisions will need to hold special elections to fill vacancies for Spring 2019.

Academic Senate By-Laws

139: Vacancies on the Senate between elections resulting from leaves or resignations may be filled temporarily by an appointment made by other Senators from the Division involved. Such appointees shall only serve until a regular or special election is held. In the event a Division is represented by only one Senator, the temporary appointment to fill that vacancy may be made by the Chair of the Elections Committee. (3/14/79)

140: No elected Senator, once his or her term has begun, shall have his/her term in office reduced, except as provided in paragraph 141. (3/14/79)

141: A Senator must attend or be represented by proxy for at least five out of every nine meetings or that Senator shall be terminated as a member and a new election to replace that person shall be called.(3/14/79) Attendance is defined as physical presence at the meeting (11/12/02).

- 3. The committee will hold off on making any term length recommendations until the faculty chairs, and all faculty training are done; Also until AB 705 impact study is completed and we know the outcome of CTA negotiations on the 16-week flexible calendar.
