NASA Scientist Presents on Nanotechnology at SBVC

On Thursday, February 9th, the Science Division hosted a talk on Nanotechnology presented by Meyya Meyyappan, Chief Scientist for Exploration Technology at the Center for Nanotechnology, NASA Ames Research Center in Moffett Field, CA. Over eighty students and staff attended the lecture that focused on the basics of nanotechnology.

After defining and describing property changes of nanomaterials, Dr. Meyyappan shared examples of the impact on manufacturing, such as self-healing materials. The audience was intrigued by the description of carbon nanotubes that imitated the adhesive strength of a gecko. The presentation provided examples of nanotechnology in multiple



products and industries, such as biomedicine, memory devices, super-capacitors, and even cosmetics. The presentation was recorded by students in the Radio-TV-Film Program and will be available to anyone interested in learning more about nanotechnology.

Welding Students Earn Coveted L.A. City Welder's Licenses

On February 23rd, 25 SBVC welding students appeared for the L.A. City Certified Structural Welder written exam for steel. The first part of the written test is based on welding theory while the second part of the test is based on American Welding Society (AWS) Codes for specific metal such as steel, aluminum, sheet steel, reinforcing steel and stainless steel. Twenty-four students passed the test with scores ranging from 70 to 92%. These SBVC students have completed the first step on their way to getting a coveted L.A. City Welder's license.

"Transition to Success" Partnership Formed with Adult School to Assist Students

The SBVC Reading Department has entered into a partnership with the San Bernardino Adult School to improve the college readiness of its students. The program is entitled, "Transition to Success." As part of this free program, students enroll in both a reading class at San Bernardino Valley College and participate in supplemental instruction in reading, writing, and technology through the adult school. Anticipated outcomes include higher placement scores, which could enable participants to progress to college-level courses more quickly.

The Collision Repair competition consisted of metal straightening, plastic filler repair, sanding techniques, MIG welding and an ASE (Automotive Service Excellence) test. The Refinishing competition consisted of sanding and feather-edging a panel, refinishing (painting) a fender, spray gun and application technique and an ASE test. SBVC student Sergio Gonzalez (Pictured with instructors Mark Williams and Manuel (Sonny) Loera) won a 1st place gold medal in the Collision Repair competition. The judges for both competitions were all alumni of SBVC and graduates of the Auto Collision and Refinishing program.
