8th Annual Women in Math & Science Event Builds Interest in STEM



"It doesn't hurt to do more", said Dr. Stephanie Briggs, San Bernardino Valley College (SBVC) Mathematics Professor and Science Technology Engineering and Math (STEM) Project Manager. Her comment evoked an "ah-ha" response for most in attendance at SBVC's 8th annual Celebration of Women in Mathematics and Science on Friday, March 15th.

Started in 2005, by now Interim Vice President of Instruction Dr. Haragewen Kinde, to encourage and enlighten students about women in the math and sciences fields, the seminar creates a map of how to reach success in any of life's obstacles. Dr. Briggs continued to illustrate the need for more women, as well as men, in the STEM fields by giving statistics showing how America is falling behind in these fields in comparison to other countries.

This year an impressive panel of successful women was presented to more than 100 attendees--a great majority of whom were high schools students from Ontario High School. The panel included SBVCs' Chemistry Professor Natalia Dunn, Deputy Sheriff Lolita Harper, Crime Scene Investigator in the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department, Dr. Iryna Kinzer, MD, who took Statistics and English at SBVC, Dr. Margo Machen Veterinarian, specializing in Veterinarian Medicine and Genetics, and Tutor in the Student Success Center Thuy Phan, a graduate student at UC Riverside. Each person spoke of their own experiences in their fields but all had the same thing to say: Never give up.

"Failure is your friend. It lets you know where you stand and where exactly improvements need to be made," said Dr. Margo Machen.

Following the testimonies, the seminar continued with exciting breakout sessions with each of the panelists. Deputy Harper hosted a demonstration on how to process a crime scene. Tutor Thuy Phan showed how mathematics is incorporated in the constructing of origami. Dr. Machen provided guidance and inspired her group with her words. Professor Dunn showed her group how to make lip balm using proper measurements and the scientific method. And lastly, Dr. Kinzer shared about the workings of internal organs by having her group dissect frogs.

Upon the conclusion of the session groups, students returned for the closing session for the further picking of the panelists' brains. Hands

flew up everywhere, interested in learning more from each of the women. Smiles, laughter, and head-nods resonated throughout the room.

New Middle College High School Opens With Ribbon-Cutting Ceremony



After 12 years in portable classrooms, Middle College High School has graduated to a full-fledged campus right across the street from SBVC. The ribbon-cutting ceremony held on March 25, 2013, came on the same day that students began attending classes in the 16 new classrooms on the new campus. Local elected officials, business/education leaders, and MCHS students/staff/faculty/alumni were in attendance in the new multi-purpose room on the 19,698 square foot campus covering 5.4 acres on Esperanza St. The award-winning Middle College High School boasts the highest statewide test scores for any high school in all of San Bernardino and Riverside counties. The school is a joint venture between San Bernardino City Unified School District and San Bernardino Valley College and currently enrolls 200 students with the intent to expand.

Arts & Humanities

To celebrate Women's History Month, Arts, Lectures and Diversity welcomed Lisa Wolpe, the artistic director of the Los Angeles Women's Shakespeare Company (LAWSC), who performed her one-woman show "Shakespeare and the Alchemy of Gender" on March 12th. Wolpe founded the LAWSC in 1993 and has received awards and critical praises for her roles.

The big news for the Science Division is that the Nursing Program completed its accreditation visit by the NLNAC. There are six standards and SBVC was in compliance with five standards and even excelled in the standard pertaining to faculty. It was recommended that the Nursing Program update its curriculum to the newest standards so we have started the research to follow this recommendation. We expect to receive the official notice of our accreditation standard and recommendations from NLNAC in August.

Students work diligently, and counselors continue to meet with students to complete program requirements. To remain in good standing, students must complete three counseling appointments, submit completed progress reports and attend two workshops prior to set deadlines.
