PROP. 39 CLEAN ENERGY WORKFORCE GRANT

In collaboration with our Desert Regional Consortium and the College of the Desert, our region was awarded program improvement funds to be used to strengthen existing energy efficiency/clean energy programs under the Prop. 39 California Community Colleges Clean Energy Workforce Program Grant. The Electronics and Electric Technology, Environmental Control Technology (HVAC), Welding Technology and Water Supply Technology programs from the Applied Technology, Transportation and Culinary Arts Division qualified to receive funding from this grant sometime in October 2014. The amount of funding will be based on the number of student completions for fiscal year 2013 – 2014.

ARTS & HUMANITIES

The end of the year brings great excitement for the faculty and students in the Arts and Humanities Division. The students receive scholarships from a variety of sources, including several awarded by the faculty


STUDENT SERVICES UPDATES

STUDENT HEALTH SERVICES

Blood drives for Life Stream in August, 47 pints; October, 16 pints; January, 36 pints; and April 29, 4 pints (due to our power outage). Generous donations were also made at two Red Cross blood drives this year.

Sun Room. Please note the location change. We are hoping more clerical staff can attend during the summer, with 10-hour days and fewer students. This event helps faculty and staff reduce their stress in a soothing environment as they learn how to be more consciously mindful of the present. These are important skill to practice for balanced mental health.

The strengths-based success training will be offered this summer to individuals in small groups in the Student Health Services Building. (Days and times include Mondays at 10 am or 11 am beginning June 9th; Tuesdays at 12 pm or 2 pm beginning June 10th; Wednesdays at 10 am or 11:30 am beginning June 11th; and Thursdays 12:30 pm beginning June 12th.) Classroom presentations of this approach can also be arranged on request.

ASSOCIATED STUDENT GOVERNMENT

On May 8, 2014 the Associated Student Government hosted a 31st District Congressional Candidates forum. Seven candidates participated and approximately 1,050 students and members of the community attended.



The Associated Student Government recently hosted the California Community College Region IX regional meeting on the SBVC Campus. Representatives from 13 colleges were present. Discussions included

developing strategies for presenting opinions and arguments to legislators regarding laws that affect educational costs and requirements.

FOSTER & KINSHIP CARE EDUCATION (FKCE) AND YOUTH EMPOWERMENT STRATEGIES FOR SUCCESS/INDEPENDENT LIVING PROGRAM (YESS/ILP)

The Foster & Kinship Care Education program, in conjunction with the Youth Empowerment Strategies for Success/Independent Living Program, sponsored a workshop entitled, *Making College Work for You* on

May 12, 2014 which involved foster caregivers, current foster youth and former foster youth. The event encouraged current foster youth in college to stay connected to campus supports and help students



keep their focus when life intervenes, by guiding them to plan their time to deal with the unexpected and still stay on track. Two of our foster youth spoke to the group about their college life experience and how important support was to their success. Two incoming students were mentored on the spot by our SBVC students sharing contact information. Students saw the connection between the careers they dream about and the education they need to get there.

FKCE has completed 688 training hours to date and has served over 455 unduplicated participants. Program Coordinator Karen Dixon received a special recognition for outstanding contributions to at-risk foster students of San Bernardino County from the San Bernardino County Superintendent of Schools.

ADMISSIONS & RECORDS

We have finalized priority groups for Fall 2014. On May 12th we turned the fall priority dates on in **webadvisor**. Since our last update on April 17th, we have processed **2,358 application for Summer 2014 and 1,673 for Fall**. We continue to work with DCS to finalize implementation of **openCCCapply**. Friday, May 16th, DSC presented the new web UI (Datatel). We handed out surveys to students over the last couple of weeks requesting feedback on the services we provide. Also, two of our permanent staff members have returned to work after leaves of absence.

ASSESSMENT

The assessment team of Carol and Arleen finished their offsite testing for the year. They visited 11

offsite locations, testing two to six sessions per site. The team tested 757 prospective students—a 24% increase over last year. They are now gearing up for summer and fall testing.

COUNSELING

The Counseling Department continues to provide counseling services for summer and fall registration, including other counseling services and informational workshops to the general population. Highlights of this month include: athletes graduating this year; onsite counseling in feeder high schools; end-of-year event for Puente students; faculty conference attendance for professional development and training; and presentations to peer advisors from local high schools as part of the department's partnership efforts.

The 23 athletes who have signed letters of intent for transfer and athletic scholarships with California and out-of-state universities have been counseled and closely followed up on their NCAA compliance and completion of their educational goals.

The 586 students in 10 feeder high schools have received educational counseling and abbreviated education plans on-site by the Counseling Department's designated counselor. Puente's year-end celebration was attended by 100 participants and guests, once again affirming a strong collaboration among Puente students, community mentors, families and faculty, as well as administration. Some faculty attended conferences on transfer process, Region 9 collaboration and instructional materials for SDEV courses.

A presentation to peer advisors was conducted on *Destination College: Community College Training*. Lastly, formulation of assessment measures including their content review are ongoing for the Department's SLO and SAO assessment, evaluation and improvement process.



FINANCIAL AID

The Financial Aid
Office has implemented the Wolverine Debit Card. Students can receive their disbursements either onto their card or have

them deposited into their bank account. This expedites the student financial aid process.

OCCUPATIONAL ADVANCEMENT DEPARTMENT

The Transitional Assistance Department (TAD), Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program (VITA) complet-

ed returns for SBVC students/ employees for the 2014 tax season. As a result, \$15,364 in income tax refunds and credits were generated.

The department offers employment workshops to CalWORKs, WorkAbility III and SBVC students every Tuesday from 11 am to

12:30 pm in Liberal Arts room 208, and every Thursday from 11 am to 12:30 pm in the Business room 118. Students can develop resumes and cover letters, receive employment leads, do online job searches and learn current workforce trends.

The department employees are doing an excellent job serving students/clients; thank you.

OUTREACH AND RECRUITMENT

The Outreach team hosted over 30 activities this month on and off campus, including tours and workshops. They also distributed college information.

PUENTE PROGRAM

Friday, April 11, 2014 - SBVC's Puente Team (Alma Lopez and Laura Gomez) presented program information and Puente Project brochures to the 2014 High School Counselors & Career Technicians Conference, held on campus in Business 100.

Friday, April 25, 2014 - Puente students attended UCLA'S 15TH STOMP (Student Transfer Opportunity and Mentor Program) TRANSFER CONFERENCE. Students from SoCal community colleges heard a motivational keynote speaker, spoke with UC campus representatives, attended workshops and took campus tours. This was a definite highlight for many students who could, as a result of this visit, envision themselves transferring to a UC.

Wednesday,, April 30, 2014 – A special *Mentor Thank You Dinner* took place at El Torito Restaurant in San Bernardino. This dinner acknowledged Puente mentors for their contributions to student success through their participation in being matched with Puente students. Framed certificates of appreciation were awarded to those mentors present.

Monday, May 12, 2014 - The University of California, Riverside co-hosted Puente's End-of-the-Year Celebration in their Alumni Visitor Center on campus. An elegant dinner and student-centered program awaited the near-100 Puente students, family members, mentors, and university and college representatives. UCR's Alex Ruiz, Associate Director of Undergraduate Admissions welcomed everyone. Vice Preside nt of Student Services Dr. Ricky Shabazz and Dean of Matriculation Marco Cota both addressed the attendees. Students successfully completing the year-long program were awarded their Puente embroidered stoles.

May 12th and 14th, 2014 – English 101 Puente students participated in their first ACADEMIC CONFERENCE in the President's Conference Room during their class sessions on Monday and Wednesday. Students presented their original research findings.

Thursday, May 29, 2014 – The first New-Student Puente Orientation took place from 2:00 – 3:00 p.m. in the President's Conference Room. Those in attendance who are eligible for English 015, learned more about Puente and the year-long commitment required.

TRANSFER AND CAREER SERVICES

On April 9, The Transfer and Career Services hosted the Spring Transfer Fair 2014 with participation of 30 UC, CSU, and Private and Out of State Universities. On April 10th and 11th a total of 35 SBVC transfer students

participated in a field trip to Stanford and Chico State Universities. The Transfer Celebration and Reception was held on May 9 from 4:00 pm to 6:00 pm, with a total of 101 transfer students and their family members celebrating their transfer achievement. Six (6) university representatives were in the quad area for transfer recruit-





ment and two more representatives were in the Transfer and Career Services Department on the month of May. Eight transfer students received transfer advice via e-mail by Kathy Kafela and Willene Nelson.

VETERAN RESCOURCE CENTER

Priority registration began April 15, 2014 for the summer 2014 term. We have had significant traffic in the



resource center due to all our services being combined under one facility. The VA Certifying Official has certified over 72 veteran students for their VA educational benefits, and

has serviced approximately 165 students since registration began. The VA Educational Counselor has seen 97 students since the start of summer registration and has assisted them with various requirements in regard to their education plans. The health and wellness counselor has seen 57 students since the start of priority registration. The Veterans Affairs Administrator has seen a total of 107 students since April 15, 2014. Overall the resource center has had 706 students pass through its doors since the beginning of registration. Student workers and staff conducted weekly training, in an effort to provide outstanding customer service.

DSPS

DSPS is ending the academic year of 2013-2014 with our students earning 43 AA Degrees, five AS Degrees, and 46 Certificates. Summer is starting off with 285 students enrolled. The staff is preparing for the end of the year while gearing up for the next. Ana Bojorquez, Assistive Technology Specialist, is attending one of our community partners' Rolling Start board meetings as a representative from SBVC/DSPS. Rolling Start offers services that enhance the life and educational goals of our students. Marty Milligan attended training at the High Tech Center Training Unit in Cupertino, CA to learn information and legalities surrounding the creation of alternate formats. Information gained from all meetings and trainings is utilized to enhance the services offered to our students.

Awards were made in all six of the open categories.


87th ANNUAL COMMENCEMENT
