APPLIED TECHNOLOGY, TRANSPORTATION & CULINARY ARTS

SBVC CTE PROGRAMS RECEIVE FUNDING FROM THE VICTOR VALLEY COLLEGE DISTRICT RAMP-UP PATHWAYS GRANT

Through the initiative of Chancellor Bruce Baron in supporting and collaborating with VVCD in their California Department of Education's California Career Pathways Trust Grant application, CTE programs offered at SBVC and CHC will share a portion of the \$15 million awarded for the project. Five community colleges, 19 high schools, 4 charter schools and several industry organizations are participating. Designated schools will be ramping up with implementing these improved learning collaborations as early as September/October to offer courses across the county in Industry sectors with occupational paths. The five designated occupations include Healthcare, Energy & Utilities, Manufacturing & Product Development, Transportation in Aviation/Aerospace and Vehicle Maintenance Service Repair. This grant will allow access for high school students to attend community college courses in a specifically designed "immersive" classroom virtual environment, align course curriculum across the region and increase technical knowledge for employer workplace experiences.

SBVC HOSTS CALIFORNIA WATER ENVIRONMENT ASSOCIATION (CWEA) WORKSHOP

On June 26, 2014, San Bernardino Valley College hosted the Santa Ana Riverbed Basin Section (SARBS) and California Water Environment Association (CWEA) workshop to educate workers on study tips for taking the certification tests. Over 50 area water operators attended the workshops in the Business Building. Program Chair for Water Supply Technology, Melita Caldwell-Betties, has had a relationship with the association since the early '90s. Michael Prayoonvech and Daniel Wing, Vice President and Secretary respectively, were very impressed with the

campus and hope to increase their activities in assisting water workers gain Industry certification.

- The Student Health Services Mental Health Educator provided the strengths group approach to personal development, teamwork and leadership to managers on June 26th.
- The campus-based Mental Health Grant officially concluded this month. Much of the time was spent completing the four extensive closing reports required by the grant and reviewing accomplishments. We have applied for grant sustainability funds that we expect to receive sometime in August or September. Many of the activities started as a result of the grant will continue, such as the Strengths Group Initiatives, Stress Solutions Oasis, mental health fairs, Blue Carpet events and ongoing screening efforts.
- The second mental health fair is in the planning stages. This event, "Stay Alive! Learn to Thrive,"

- will be held on October 9th, 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., in the guad area.
- Longevity Wellness Program with be back this fall to provide staff with a wellness "lunch and learn" event on October 7th and an Early Detection Screening opportunity all day on October 21st.

ADMISSIONS & RECORDS

Fall 2014 priority registration began on July 8th. We have had a consistent, steady flow of traffic for the past couple of months with summer and fall registration overlap. There have been many late add requests for the summer 2014 term from student, faculty and deans. Most of the requests were related to non-payment drops and/or students who stated they

had difficulty adding courses using the web authorization codes. On June 24th DCS successfully implemented the new open CCC apply. Staff and students have agreed that the application clearer and more user friendly. Since our last



update in June we have processed over 700 admission applications for Fall 2014. On July 26th two staff members participated in the bi-annual Big Bear Super Saturday event. One staff member at Big Bear High School assisted with registration/admission questions and another staff member in the Admissions and Records office downloaded applications every hour.

COUNSELING

The Counseling Department's emphases for August are core counseling services for fall semester students, along with a full range of counseling services for all students. Group advising on college culture, including abbreviated education planning, is afforded to new students as part of the department's implementation of the Student Success Act. Student learning outcomes on this service will be assessed.

Specialized orientations for special populations (e.g., athletes and international students) are ongoing. Nursing students receive informational workshops.

Meanwhile, counselors attended the faculty-led refresher training on the Ellucian software for education plans. Magnetic card readers have been successfully installed and are now used for appointments.

FINANCIAL AID

Financial Aid is excited to offer the new Wolverine Card to students. Beginning fall 2014, all financial aid awards will be disbursed on the new Wolverine Card



with the option for students to select electronic transfer to their own personal bank account.

Financial Aid is also excited to announce that the office will be imple-

menting Auto-Packager in an effort to get financial aid funds to students more quickly. The Financial Aid Office is undergoing testing measures to ensure accuracy and will start utilizing Auto-Packager once testing is complete.

The Financial Aid office has already received 20,818 FAFSA applications for the 2014-2015 academic year as of July 17, 2014. Comparatively, we received 30,743 FAFSA applications for the entire 2013-2014 academic year. The Financial Aid office has disbursed \$20,145,428 in Pell grant funds for the 2013-2014 academic year.

We will begin disbursing aid for the 2014-2015 academic year in August. All SBVC students are reminded to complete either the **2014-2015 FAFSA** application (citizen and eligible non-citizen students) or the **2014-2015 California Dream Act** application (AB540 students) to automatically be considered for a 2014-2015 BOG fee waiver.

So far The California Student Aid Commission (CSAC) has awarded 1,969 Cal Grant awards to SBVC students, 66 of which are for eligible AB540 students. CSAC will continue awarding students throughout the year. Comparatively, The Financial Aid office awarded 2,277 Cal Grant awards, 58 of which were for eligible AB540 students for the entire 2013-2014 academic year.

The 2014-2015 SBVC Foundation Scholarship application will open in October 2014.

OCCUPATIONAL ADVANCEMENT DEPARTMENT (CalWORKS & WorkAbility III)

The County of San Bernardino Workforce Investment Board and San Bernardino Valley College will co-host



the 2014 East Valley Regional Job Fair, to be held at San Bernardino Valley College on Thursday, August 28, from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. in the Business Building Conference Center, Room B-100.

The department offers employment workshops to CalWORKs, WorkAbility III and SBVC students every Thursday from 11:30am to 3:00pm in the Business Bldg. Room 125. Students will have the opportunity to develop resumes and cover letters, receive employment leads; online job search, and receive current workforce trends to enter the workforce.

The department staff is doing an excellent job serving our students/clients; thank you.

OUTREACH AND RECRUITMENT

The Outreach and Recruitment team is planning its Outreach Calendar for the academic year with a variety of workshops and campus tours. Outreach and recruitment technician Clyde Williams is organizing an on-campus event for feeder high school counselors.

VETERANS RESOURCE CENTER

The traffic in the resource center has been consistent since our last report. Priority registration for veterans began on July 8th. The VA Certifying Official continues to certify veteran students for their VA educational benefits, and has serviced approximately 75 students since fall registration began. The VA Educational Counselor has seen approximately 90 students

since the last report. The health and wellness counselor has seen approximately 45 students since the start of priority registration. This number has remained the same due to the limited availability of slots. Overall the resource center continues to have hundreds of students pass through its doors. VA students come in for counseling, certification, registration questions, and to utilize the computers.

YOUTH EMPOWERMENT STRATEGIES FOR SUCCESS/ INDEPENDENT LIVING PROGRAM (YESS/ILP) & KIN-SHIP CARE EDUCATION (FKCE)

FKCE participated in the annual Sports Faire event on Saturday, June 21st, at San Bernardino Valley College with Children and Family Services by providing training to foster and kinship parents.

FKCE will begin offering its new classes on August 5th. Over 700 Summer/Fall booklets were mailed to foster parents, relative caregivers, foster family agencies and community partners. For more information call 909-384-4457.

ASSESSMENT

The assessment team of Carol and Arleen tested high school students from various schools who transferred to Middle College High School (MCHS) for the 2014 / 2015 school year.

The Student Area Outcome (SAO) assessment of the Center found that clients received quality services and understood the assessment process; 91% rated the overall service good, while 99% rated staff courteous and professional!

Overall, students are satisfied with the services they receive. Student comments were positive. Carol and Arleen are doing a great job.

Assessment Center is preparing for the Fall 2014 semester, using the overflow room ADSS102C to accommodate students who want to assess. The Assessment Center has not turned away any students who want to assess, so long as they have a picture ID, know their student ID, and have the orientation completion certificate.
