The SBVC students returned to campus and expressed their enthusiasm for the experience.

STUDENT SERVICES UPDATES

ADMISSIONS & RECORDS

Since our last update, the "add" and "drop" period without a "W" notation has passed. During this time we have received over 100 late add petitions for various reasons, the most common being students dropped for non-payment. We are in the process of creating a grading and enrollment information packet for faculty. We are also looking to create an Admissions and Records timeline that will include the deadline dates for items such as: admission applications, graduation applications, term deadlines, and priority dates for a full academic year.

It is our goal to inform students and encourage them to plan ahead. Since the last update, we have processed 881 admission applications for the fall 2014 term and 380 for spring 2015. In addition, April Dale-Carter attended the



new directors' conference in Sacramento on September 8-10. This was a great opportunity for her to develop relationships and network with more experienced A&R directors and deans. She now has several colleagues that she can call upon to pick their brains on various topics.

ASSESSMENT

The Assessment Center tested 33 Middle College High School Freshmen (MCHS). The Assessment Center also had 1,577 student contacts. The Assessment Center continues to assess students who want to attend late start sessions. Carol and Arleen are preparing for the month to come.

CalWORKs AND WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

More than 500 job seekers had an opportunity to talk to 30 employers from different industries (health care, law enforcement, hospitality, manufacturing; just to name a few) at the East Valley Job Fair held on Thursday, August 28, 2014 at San Bernardino Valley College in the Business Building Room 100. The event was a collaborative effort between the Workforce Development Department and San Bernardino Valley College. Due to the great attendance, both organizations have planned to work together on future employment activities.

The department offers employment workshops to CalWORKs, WorkAbility III and SBVC students every Thursday from 11:30 a.m. to 3:0 0.p.m. in the Business Building, room 125. Students will have the opportunity to develop resumes and cover letters, receive employment leads; online job search, and receive current workforce trends to enter the workforce.

The department staff are doing an excellent job serving our students and clients; thank you.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE PAST MONTH

Without a doubt, two of the biggest highlights of the past month were our two Law Enforcement Academy graduations. The Extended Academy graduation was held in our newly renovated Auditorium on Saturday,



COUNSELING

A full range of services continue to be provided to the general population with a special focus on assisting late start registrants. Initial education plans and expanded orientation have been provided to all new students in compliance with the Student Success Act. Expanded orientation for veterans will be conducted at the end of the month.

Meanwhile, continuing students have been given assistance for their comprehensive education plans. Informational meetings for nursing students continue to be delivered with an emphasis on new application procedures for students with previous college units. Classroom presentations about counseling services have also started, and counselors teaching SDEV classes have invited Health Services personnel to conduct presentations on Strengths' Quest to SDEV students.

All international students have been enrolled in the SEVIS database and are in compliance with the USCIS regulations. Staff also attended the Conference on Student Success and Support for professional development training.

FINANCIAL AID

Financial Aid has announced that the office will be going virtually paperless. Students can now expect to receive award letter notifications as well as initial missing document emails, sent to them at their school email address instead of via postal mail at their home address. Not only will this save the office

> thousands of dollars in postage costs, it will also allow students to receive updates on their Financial Aid files more quickly and securely.

As a result of implementing Auto-Packager, the financial aid office was able to award an additional 619 students so far this semester.

A total of 1,234 students has received their first disbursement for the 2014/2015 award year totaling over \$1.4 million.

The Financial Aid office has already received 25,612 FAFSA applications for the 2014-15 academic year as of September 15, 2014. Comparatively, we received 30,743 FAFSA applications for the entire 2013-14 academic year.

All SBVC students are reminded to complete either the 2014-15 FAFSA application (citizen and eligible non-citizen students) or the 2014-15 California Dream Act application (AB540 students) to automatically be considered for a 2014-15 Board of Governors (BOG) fee waiver.

As of September 12, 2014, the California Student Aid Commission (CSAC) has awarded 2,335 Cal Grant awards to SBVC students, 83 of which are for eligible AB540 students. The Financial Aid Office has received Cal Grant funding and will be disbursing a total of \$272,028 to eligible students on September 19, 2014.

All students who have not already completed their 2014-15 FAFSA Application are encouraged to do so as soon as possible.

The 2014-15 SBVC Foundation Scholarship application will open in October.

OUTREACH AND RECRUITMENT

The Outreach and Recruitment team has been busy attending events that involved handing out useful SBVC information.

SBVC. The goal of the presentations is to give students the admissions information they need for transfer to UCLA. He will be pre-

senting to a range of courses, including Philosophy, Digital Logic Design, Anthropology, Student Development and English.

VETERANS RESOURCE CENTER

The traffic in the resource center has seen a significant increased since the last report. The VA Certify-



ing Official has certified over 200 veteran students for their VA educational benefits and has serviced approximately 250 students since registration began. The VA Educational Counselor has seen 90 students since the last report.

The health and wellness

counselor has seen 57 students since the last report; this number has remained the same due to limited slot availability. The Admissions/Records Specialist certifying official has seen a total of over 200 students since the last report.

Overall, the resource center has had 400 students pass through its doors since the last report. Student workers and staff conducted weekly trainings in an effort to provide ever-better customer service.

FOSTER & KINSHIP CARE EDUCATION (FKCE)

The Foster & Kinship Care Education Program has successfully completed 40 classes and served 102 foster and kinship participants since the beginning of August 2014. It appears there has been an increase in participation due to the emphasis by Children and Family Services on Caregivers meeting their training

requirements to improve the safety of children in out-ofhome care.

Kinship care continues to increase as children are living in informal, voluntary and formal kinship care ar-



rangements. This has presented some changes for the kinship caregivers. The FKCE trainings provide information and resources to assist these caregivers to give the best care they can to children whose parents cannot care for them. "Parenting is a labor of love. It is being loving without expectations."

FKCE held a preliminary meeting to begin developing and laying the foundation for community partnerships that support San Bernardino Valley College's Guardian Scholars Program for foster youth. A representative from Foster Youth Services and the Children and Family Services (CFS) Educational Liaisons office attended.

One of the outcomes of this meeting was to begin the groundwork for the Guardian Scholars Conference/Luncheon. A future meeting is being planned to include representatives from the County of San Bernardino Independent Living Program, California Youth Connection, California College Pathways, Children's Network, Children's Fund, Foster Club, CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocate), CWA (Child Welfare Attendance) along with ILP Peer and Family Assistants. The conference/luncheon is tentatively scheduled for May 2015 and will provide a platform to inform the community about what the program has to offer youth in the foster care system who wish to pursue a college education.

Since the beginning of the fall semester there have been 125 new foster youth contacts. Out of those, 25 foster youth have visited the Foster Youth Services office located at the Campus Center Room 208 for assistance with registration, orientation, assessment, textbooks, questions regarding Financial Aid and general information about the college. With the existing foster youth on campus (35), this brings the total of foster youth who have come to the FYS office to 60.

YOUTH EMPOWERMENT STRATEGIES FOR SUCCESS/ INDEPENDENT LIVING PROGRAM (YESS/ILP)

Thirty-two high school foster youth have been referred by the San Bernardino County Independent Living Program to begin the 2014-15 San Bernardino Valley College YESS/ILP 14-week Life Skills classes on Wednesday, September 17, 2014. These classes include a module on Daily Living Skills, Education, Employment, and Financial Literacy.

LIBRARY & LEARNING SUPPORT SERVICES

During the first month of classes the Library has seen an average of 2,864 visitors a day Monday through Thursday, 728 on Fridays and 264 on Saturdays.

DSPS

The DSPS staff continues to support our students in their academic goals through the services it provides. Interim Coordinator Marty Milligan attended training for DSPS Directors and Coordinators. Information gained from all meetings and trainings helps to enhance the services we offer our students.
