

Rance Freeman Laboratory Technician Department of Art





Ailsa (pronounced Elsa) emigrated from the Philippines in September 1988 and started at SBVC in 1989. She had experience as an aca-



demic counselor and associate professor. She served oneand-a-half years as a consultant and teaching faculty in Indonesia. And associate professor at two colleges in the Philppines.

She believes in the concept of lifelong learning, and so matriculated at the University of La Verne, earning her PsyD in Clinical and Community Psychology in 2004. Ailsa is licensed as a clinical psychologist. She and her husband of 21 years, Victor, reside in Colton. 

ATHLETICS DEPARTMENT

SBVC Men's Basketball ended the 2014-2015 regular season claiming their 14th Conference championship, the Foothill Conference Coach of the Year award given to head coach Quincy Brewer and the MVP award was handed to sophomore guard Charles Callison. The team finished the regular season, ranked second in the state with a 29-2 overall record and a 10-0 conference record, wrapping up the regular season winning 18 straight games. They were rewarded with the 3 seed in the Southern California Regional Playoffs.



SBVC Women's Basketball head coach Susan Crebbin was named to her fifth Foothill Conference Coach of the Year award. An award bestowed upon Crebbin after guiding SBVC to



SBVC Men's Track & Field took victories in 6 events including the 1500 Meter Run, the 800 Meter Run, the 3000 Meter Run, the 4x400 Meter Relay, the Long Jump and the

STUDENT SERVICES UPDATES

ADMISSIONS & RECORDS

Since our last update we have processed 354 admission applications for Spring 2015 and 1,833 for Summer 2015. Priority registration for Summer 2015 will be available to students via WebAdvisor beginning March 16th. We will open Fall 2015 admissions applications April 1st. Evaluators are currently reviewing Spring 2015 graduation applications and verifying AA-T and AS-T degrees through the new ADT CSU-e-verify system. The deadline for summer grads to submit a graduation application and participate in the graduation ceremony is April 30th. In the next few weeks we will post the priority dates for Fall 2015.

ASSOCIATED STUDENT GOVERNMENT (ASG) / OF-FICE OF STUDENT LIFE

Associated Student Government sponsored a trip held on March 1st and 2nd to the state capital for the annual March in March trip. The trip offered our stu-

dents the opportunity to speak with state legislators on issues within the higher education and community college system. Board President and former



Assembly Member John Longville accompanied the students.

On March 13th the Office of Student Life, in conjunction with the First Year Experience (FYE) program, hosted a Student Leadership Conference that focused on student success, engagement, team building, transfer & career, follow-up services and skills development.

On April 16th the Office of Student Life and Associated Student Government will host a Homeless Student Informational Forum. This event will provide an opportunity for students in need to connect with resources and receive support that can make a big difference. Most are not homeless by choice. They may have been kicked out of the family home, lost a job or gotten sick. They may be living in a car, on the street or couch-surfing with friends. Going to school allows them to focus on and plan for a better future.

The Inter Club Council held their spring Club Rush event on March 11, 2015. Club Rush is a recruitment tool that many clubs use to get information to students while also recruiting new members.

GUARDIAN SCHOLARS PROGRAM

The number of foster youth who have applied to San Bernardino Valley College has increased by approximately 15%. The Guardian Scholars program is in the process of preparing for its first major conference in May.



COUNSELING

Counseling services to the general student population include comprehensive education plans, follow-up and our "Ask A Counselor" classroom presentations, which are focused on classes with the supplemental instruction component.

The High School Connection Program affords high school seniors enhanced orientation workshops and initial education plan services. We are processing documents for international students for the recertification of SBVC academic programs in the Student and Exchange Visitor Information System (SEVIS).

We also held a mentor-mentee activity for the PUENTE Project. We made preparations for oncampus workshops aimed at probation/dismissal students, along with students who are undecided on their plans of study (formerly called majors). Lastly, formal evaluations and consultations for the Counseling Department's Service Area Outcomes and Student Learning Outcomes are ongoing.

FINANCIAL AID

Financial Aid is excited to offer the new Wolverine Card to students. Beginning Fall 2014, all financial aid awards will be disbursed on the new Wolverine Card with the option for students to select direct deposit

to their own personal bank account.



The Financial Aid office will be going virtually paperless. Students can now expect to receive award letter notifications as well

as initial missing document emails, sent to their school-provided email address, instead of via snail mail at their home address. This saves the office thousands of dollars in postage and allows students to receive updates on their Financial Aid files more securely and quickly.

The Financial Aid Computer Lab lets students check WebAdvisor, complete their FAFSA application and make necessary updates to their FAFSA application.

A total of 4,848 students have received their first disbursement for the 2014-15 award year totaling over 13 million dollars.

The Financial Aid office has already received 29,599 FAFSA applications for the 2014-15 academic year as of March 10, 2015. Comparatively, we received 30,743 FAFSA applications for the entire 2013-14 academic year.

Also as of March 10th, the California Student Aid Commission (CSAC) has awarded 2,687 Cal Grant

awards to SBVC students, 77 of which are to AB540 students. For the 2014-15 academic year, the Financial Aid Office has disbursed \$1,419,2387 in Cal Grant B funds and \$50,886 in Cal Grant C funds. Additional disbursements will follow.

Additionally, now is the time for students to start preparing for the 2015-16 award year! Paper BOG Applications are not required. All students need to do is complete their FAFSA or Dream Act Application online and a BOG Fee waiver will automatically be applied to their account for those who qualify. Students are encouraged to complete their 2015-2016 FAFSA or Dream Act application online NOW in preparation for Fall 2015 registration.

Students who would like assistance in completing the FAFSA application or California Dream Act application should visit the Financial Aid Computer Lab.

FIRST YEAR EXPERIENCE-VALLEY BOUND COMMIT-MENT/DREAMERS

The Director and staff of First Year Experience are extremely busy planning and implementing this new program.

Visits have been made to high schools in the San Bernardino, Colton and Rialto school districts, speaking with counselors and staff to determine how SBVC can better serve their students. Information was shared about the various programs that are offered at our college.

FYE is in the process of planning and preparing for two upcoming conferences in April, both geared toward educating students on the benefits of attending SBVC.

The Dreamers Conference: April 17th The Male/Senior Day Conference: April 24th

On April 14th FYE will host a grand opening for the new "Dreamers Resource Center," serving our AB540 students and the community. Everyone is welcome.

FYE is actively recruiting for Valley-Bound and FYE students. Two hundred and thirty scholarships will

be awarded to individuals who apply and meet the qualifications for either of these programs. The application deadline is April 30th. Applications may be obtained by visiting Liberal



Arts Building, Room 147.

FYE will be holding an informational summit May 1, 2015 for the SBVC campus stakeholders.

YOUTH EMPOWERMENT STRATEGIES FOR SUCCESS/ INDEPENDENT LIVING PROGRAM (YESS/ILP)

Students in our Life Skills classes for foster youth in high school use a computer lab on the SBVC campus to learn how to create cover letters and résumés. They also learn how to complete job applications, learn interviewing skills, and the importance of receiving an education to obtain better paying jobs.

TRANSFER AND CAREER SERVICES

Next Step workshops are planned for the 525 SBVC students that have been conditionally accepted to CSU San Bernardino. We invite our students to stay on track with the admissions process.

Transfer Center sponsored a two-day campus visit to San Jose State, San Francisco State and UC Davis. The college tour took place March 13 and 14, 2015.

TUMAINI PROGRAM

Tumaini program participants participated in UCLA's spring Umoja Symposium on March 20th.

Tumaini students have been interviewing African American legends in the community to document the stories of African Americans in the San Bernardino area. The students will present their stories.

VETERANS RESOURCE CENTER

The Veterans Resource Center has continued to increase the traffic in both the certification of Veteran Students for VA benefits (198 Certifications), and students that have entered the doors and been serviced by the VRC staff (1,307 Students).

The VRC team has continued to conduct formal biweekly meetings to establish ways to provide excellent customer service, recruit, and establish contact with the Veteran student population on the San Bernardino Valley College campus. The VA Educational Counselor has seen 87 students since the beginning of the semester, continuing to be instrumental in the VA Officials Certification process. The center has an upcoming rededication ceremony on April 9th.

VRC is now equipped with new study stacks/cubicles, proper signage to display our location and an updated, stronger Wi-Fi signal.


