PRESIDENT'S Valley College Board Report



Between 2010 and 2016, the number of degrees and certificates received by graduates at San Bernardino Valley College has increased from 964 to 1421, or by 47%.

According to Dr. James Smith, Dean of Research, Planning, and Institutional Effectiveness, this increase can be attributed to a number of positive changes that have transformed the college's academic environment over a short time period. One major change has been an expansion of the number of courses offered online, which makes studying at SBVC much more convenient for employed students and part-time students.

During this same period, the college launched several major grant-funded programs, such as HSI STEM PASS GO and HACU, which provided many SBVC students with increased access to support services like tutoring and supplemental instruction.

Another major change was the college's adoption of requiring comprehensive educational plans for all students, which clarified the exact pathway every student needs to take to complete the requirements for a degree or certificate.

During this same time, faculty and administrators began to explore a number of innovative course delivery models, such as accelerated basic skills courses and learning communities.

This dramatic increase of the number of degrees and certificates awarded brought SBVC to the attention of the Aspen Institute, a prestigious national organization that rewards community college excellence and improvement with a \$1,000,000 prize every two years. The increase in SBVC's graduation rates contributed to the campus being selected as one of the 150 most improved community colleges in the nation from a total of more than 1,500 community colleges.

On June 2, 2016, SBVC was one of only 27 colleges that were interviewed to be selected among the top 10 community colleges in the nation. We will be notified in mid-August about whether we are in the 10 improved community colleges in the nation. Being selected in the top 150 has brought positive attention to the campus and city. Being selected in the 10 will be an even greater honor. We'll keep our fingers crossed as we continue to strive for success!

Alumni Spotlight: J.M. Moore



Had an elevator malfunction not occurred, J.M. Moore's new book, The History of the Barclay Hotel, might not exist. Moore, a 2015 San Bernardino Valley College graduate, lived in the downtown Los Angeles building, built in 1897, from 2005 to 2012. One day in 2008, she was in the elevator, trying to get to her fifth floor apartment, when she was taken to the basement instead. "I found it very odd because a key needs to be used in order for the elevator to open at the basement

level," she said. "Nevertheless, the door slowly slid open and there I stood, exposed to its stagnant, stale and murky atmosphere." Moore could hear the hum of the furnace and a small animal scattering away, and was "over-come with a feeling deep within myself warning me not to step foot off of that elevator and into the basement." She quickly pushed the up button and made her way to her apartment, but she was intrigued by what she saw: "It was then that I knew something not so pleasant happened in that basement." Wanting to know more about the Barclay Hotel, Moore searched through the Los Angeles Public Library's databases and microfilm collection, and after discovering facts about the building, realized that a lot of the information online was incorrect. "The deeper I got into research, the more events I uncovered and the higher the body count got," she said. "I decided that since there were so many events that occurred at the hotel, it was worth compiling all of the stories into one book."

Moore uncovered information on murders, suicides, accidental deaths, fires and other unexplained events at the hotel, and she started to feel uncomfortable living in the building as she re-searched its sordid history. She took a break from her studies, moved to San Bernardino and after graduating with honors from SBVC in December 2015, thought it was time to revisit the project. "I already had the stories that I wanted to highlight, tucked safely away in my mind," she said. "I just needed to research and record the resources." For nearly two months, Moore spent about 15 hours a day working on the book, sometimes not even stopping to eat. She says it's the only book that chronicles the history of the historic monument. She's also not finished writing books. In The History of the Barclay Hotel, Moore briefly discusses her seven years spent in the building, and her next book will "go into detail about the events that happened to me while I was a tenant," she said. "Some happenings were unsettling and in-explicable in nature, while others were divine and captivating." Moore will be holding book signings in San Bernardino and Los Angeles this summer and fall.
