

# VP Brings Adventure and Love for Outdoors to Daily Work at SBVC



Some folks look to unwind after a hard day's work at a nice, calm spa, or go for a night of deep restful sleep. Others, like Scott Stark, enjoy unwinding down the side of the steep rocky slope.

When he's not at his high-pressure day job, the Vice President of Administrative Services at San Bernardino Valley College, he is on call into the wee hours of the morning to help save those lost, stuck, or injured in the wilderness.

The volunteer EMT search and rescue specialist for the San Bernardino Sheriff's Department wouldn't trade the experience for any amount of vacation time. To him, it is the vacation. When 911 calls for Stark's services come in, someone is often lost, on the edge of a cliff, or seriously injured. He and other highly trained volunteers spring into action.

Hauling 50-pound backpacks loaded with rescue gear and rope, they often hike miles into the forest, where helicopters either can't muster the wind or fit into the most confined crevices of the San Bernardino Mountains. When they locate the victim, they need to be clear-headed enough to render medical aid and extract him or her to safety. "When the initial search is over, we have to have the energy to get out of there, many times carrying the subject in a litter," said Stark. "We don't always have a helicopter ride out."

In addition to basic search and rescue, he is also certified for winter mountaineering rescue, rope rescue, rescue utilizing helicopters, and highly technical over-the-cliff rescues. Read the rest of this article at www.valleycollege.edu/news.



## Community Members Earn Certificates at SBVC

Fifteen students enrolled in Cajon High School's medical career pathway program were among the first to also earn workforce readiness certificates from San Bernardino Valley College. The 72-hour course prepares students for interviews, putting together resumes, providing customer service, employer expectations, and more, and is the first program of its kind to be offered for free to high school students in the Inland Empire. Once the course is finished, students qualify for paid internships provided by the San Bernardino County Workforce Development Board at Arrowhead Regional Medical Center and work experience credit from SBVC. The program was designed by the San Bernardino Community College District's Office of Economic Development and Corporate Training. Congratulations, Wolverines!


# SBVC Receives \$25,000 Grant from SoCal Gas

# **Faculty Spotlight: James Stewart**



Professor **James Stewart** has been teaching at San Bernardino Valley College since 1976, and is still as enthused to work with students now as he was then.

An art instructor, Stewart calls SBVC's facilities "world class" with "state-of-the-art equipment," and is proud of the education provided to students. "It's the best foundation for other higher division courses," he said. "Classes are low-cost, and students can be here and learn and take advantage of that value. Dollar for dollar, the education is second to none. This is the best deal anywhere."

He teaches students who want to receive their associate's degrees and move on to four-year institutions or specialty schools, as well as adult learners who are interested in taking one or two courses for personal enrichment.

"We are open to all," Stewart said. "We support our community and give them what they want. Many times,

people come in and ask how they can take one class, and that leads to another. Once they get on campus, they discover something in one area that's translatable and transferable to other classes."

SBVC is one of just a handful of community colleges in Southern California that offers a comprehensive glass program. Stewart said that when high school students visit campus, they are "blown away" that such unique classes are offered, and excited to know that they can participate once they enroll at SBVC. Some of Stewart's students have gone on to study glass at the finest schools around the world, including in Murano, Italy. They have opened their own studios, or work at places like the Museum of Glass in Tacoma.



# Ratio of SBVC's Hispanic Students in STEM Bucks National Trend



SBVC's Department of Research, Planning and Institutional Effectiveness recently discovered an exciting trend among the college's Hispanic students: they have earned more STEM degrees over the past five years than ever before.

This is exciting news because there is an increased national demand for STEM graduates, and Hispanic students constitute the largest minority group in the public school system yet enroll at much lower levels, so they are underrepresented in STEM programs.

"We have seen an increase in enrollment by Hispanic students in STEM majors over the past 5 years," said Christie Gabriel-Millette, SBVC's senior research analyst. "There has also been an increase in graduates in STEM fields, as well as a trend showing Hispanic students earning more degrees than certificates." Congratulations, SBVC!
