San Bernardino Valley College's Office of Outreach & Recruitment is essential to encouraging prospective, incoming, and transfer students to reach their academic goals on campus. Outreach Coordinator Cindy Huerta strives to motivate and empower prospective students in pursuit of their educational goals by promoting awareness of student support services, academic programs and other scholastic opportunities at SBVC. Part of Huerta's newest outreach efforts include translating presentation materials and other documents into Spanish, which helps her serve as a bridge into the local community. She and Alejandra Aguilera, the social media coordinator at SBVC, both recently translated the "Steps to Enrollment" brochure, and are currently working on new Spanish-language materials for the First Year Experience program. Thanks to the hard work of Huerta, Aguilera, and SBVC's student ambassadors, SBVC is able to reach a broader audience in both English and Spanish. "The SBVC Outreach and Recruitment Office plays a vital role on campus," Huerta said. "We are constantly on the go and in the community spreading the word about all of the amazing programs and student support services the college offers." SBVC Retiree Resurrects a Lost Art Form

While technically retired, Mark Ikeda is as busy as ever, and still connected to San Bernardino Valley College. The Professor Emeritus of Biology retired in July 2014, and in the years since, has been working with current SBVC students and faculty to classify and curate a collection of thousands of plant specimens, with some dating back to the 1920s and others now extinct. Together, they have been constructing a digital database that lists each specimen's biology, taxonomy, site, and unique characteristics observed at the time of collection. It's been an "enchanting experience" working with the student volunteers and teaching them the process of putting together herbarium sheets, Ikeda said. He first discovered the biology department's herbarium cabinets, holding thousands of historical and unclassified plant specimens, when he started teaching general biology, anatomy, and human physiology at SBVC in 1990. These specimens are an "irreplaceable resource," he said, and Ikeda became determined to catalog the specimens in a digital database so the information is known forever and can be used by researchers and students alike. Ikeda now works closely with Tatiana Vasquez, SBVC's biology major adviser and the proprietor of the collection, coming in two or three times a week to assist Vasquez and interested students with the cataloging. It can take two to three hours to identify each specimen, and sometimes, the fruits or flowers need to be dissected. The process involves collecting the specimens, identifying then classifying using large taxonomic keys, pairing organisms with similar species, then assembling the herbarium sheets. 




Campus Encouraged to "Build Dreams" in 2018-19

Computer Engineering Student Interning at Jet Propulsion Laboratory



Chris Esquer-Rosas is having a summer he'll never forget. Over the last few months, Esquer-Rosas, a computer engineering student at SBVC, has been interning at the Jet Propulsion Lab. He's working on the "Starshade," a giant sunflower-shaped shade that, when launched into space, will suppress sunlight, allowing researchers to directly image exoplanets. He became interested in origami while in elementary school, and is using his skills to work on building Starshade's Petal Launch and Unfurler System. When Starshade unfurls in space, it is supposed to be the size of a baseball diamond, and Esquer-Rosas told JPL's Education Office he is working to make sure that none of the petals touch each other. Esquer-Rosas said since starting at JPL, he's been surprised to learn that origami has a place in space. "That's what blew my mind," he said to JPL.

SBVC Alumna Becomes Manager of Coyote Radio Station at CSUSB

When a DJ at a local radio station told her about the telecommunications program at San Bernardino Valley College, Kelli Cluque decided to pay the campus a visit. "I went to the radio and TV stations and thought, this is it!" she said. Cluque enrolled and earned her associate's degree in two years, spending the first year studying radio and the second television. "It was a great experience to be a student and have access to real radio and TV stations," she said. Cluque went on to earn her bachelor's degree in radio, television, and film management from San Diego State University, and launched a career that took her around the United States, with stops at local stations KCAL, KCX, and KATY. She has more than 50,000 hours of live onair experience, and just left her position as associate program director and on-air personality at KCAL/KOLA in Redlands. She is now embarking on a new role as operations coordinator for Coyote Radio and Advertising at Cal State San Bernardino. Coyote Radio and Advertising is a hands-on learning lab that teaches students about everything from radio broadcasting to graphic design to media programming, and Cluque will oversee the radio station in the areas of production, music, on-campus promotions, on-air presentation, and student learning. SBVC Welcomes Newest Cohort of Valley-Bound Commitment Students

When they start classes at SBVC this fall, 11 highly-motivated San Gorgonio High School graduates will have their first year of tuition on campus covered, making their path to graduating and earning their degrees that much easier. These new Wolverines are participating in the Valley-Bound Commitment program, which removes economic barriers for first-year students. Valley-Bound offers not only \$5,000 for tuition and living expenses, but also priority registration, a dedicated team of counselors and classified staff that works with students throughout the year, field trips to colleges and universities, peer mentoring, books, parking permits, and school supplies. Valley-Bound, operated by the SBVC Foundation and largely funded by the San Manuel Band of Mission Indians, is now in its tenth year. In its first year, Valley-Bound offered assistance to 31 students, and by the 2016-17 school year, the program had grown to 230 students. Congratulations, SBVC!

SBVC Men's Cross Country Coach Named "Best in the State"

San Bernardino Valley College men's cross country coach Jim Ratigan was selected as the state's top cross country coach by the California Community College Cross Country and Track and Field Coaches Association. Ratigan, who has led SBVC to a conference championship in each of his five years of leading the Wolverines, received the award at the association's meeting in August. According to the association, Ratigan was chosen due to his positive contributions to the sport and coaches association, his ethical behavior and outstanding sportsmanship, and the quality of the cross country program at SBVC this year. "Thank you to my fellow coaches for this great honor," Ratigan



said. "This award means a lot to me as a coach and educator. To put in the work not only as a coach, but more importantly as educator and a role model for my athletes and have this recognition is incredible." Ratigan is beginning his 11th year as a coach at SBVC, previously serving as an assistant coach. The Wolverines have won 22 consecutive conference titles, and finished fourth in the state last year in cross country. In earning this award, Ratigan credits the help he has gotten over the years. The Wolverines will open their season September 1 by running at the Redlands Invitational, then will host two meets this season. The Pacific Coast Athletic Conference preview race will be September 22, followed by the PCAC Championships on October 20. Both events will be run at Cal State San Bernardino beginning at 10 a.m. Good luck this season, Wolverines!
