SBVC Ranked One of Best Online Community Colleges in California

San Bernardino Valley College is once again ranked among the best community colleges in California. SR Education Group, an educational research publisher, just released its inaugural ranking of the Best Online Community Colleges by state, and SBVC came in twelfth place in California. SR Education Group looked at retention and graduation rates, percentage of online enrollment data, and the number of online associate degrees offered. "Community colleges offer some of the most affordable degrees in the country," SR Education Group CEO Sung Rhee said in a statement. "With a growing number of these degrees becoming available online, we wanted to let prospective students know about these great, accessible options near them. By providing these resources, we hope to help more people reach their educational and professional goals." The ranking acknowledges SBVC's offerings of associate degrees in various fields, including Administration of Justice, Anthropology, Liberal Arts, Philosophy, Sociology, and more. Students can also pursue a variety of online certificates, where all remote students have the opportunity to still participate in free tutoring sessions through the campus writing centers.

SBVC Staff Member Awarded 'Employee of the Year' by the CCCBOG

SBVC classified professional Mary Valdemar was among only three outstanding community college employees honored by the California Community Colleges Board of Governors on May 21. The Community College Classified Employee of the Year Award, presented by the Board of Governors along with the Chancellor's Office, recognizes outstanding classified employees throughout the community college system. Valdemar has held many positions during her 12 years at SBVC, leading up to her current role in SBVC's Department of Library and Learning Support Services. She has served as a leader within numerous organizations and has pushed to empower disenfranchised members of campus. First California Surgeon General Visits CDC

SBVC faculty and staff members met with Dr. Nadine Burke Harris, California's first-ever surgeon general, during a campus visit in June. Dr. Burke Harris, a pediatrician, strives to bring awareness of adverse childhood experiences and toxic stress, which have negative effects on health. During her visit to the Child Development Center, Burke Harris met with SBVC President Diana Z. Rodriguez and officials from Children's Fund, First 5 San Bernardino, Loma Linda University, San Bernardino County Department of Behavioral Health, and Young Women's Empowerment Foundation. "It's an old saying: 'An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure,'" Burke Harris said. "When we practice early detection and early interventions, we see better health outcomes."

SBVC Alumna Becomes First Black Female to Earn Chemistry PhD from UNLV

Her love of chemistry has opened doors for SBVC alumna Schetema Nealy. Born in San Bernardino, Nealy was one of five children raised by a single mother. While working at a grocery store, Nealy enrolled in classes at SBVC, before transferring to the University of California Los Angeles and earning two master's degrees. Most recently, Nealy, now a 39-year-old mother of two, graduated from the PhD program at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas, becoming the first African-American woman to earn her PhD in chemistry from the school. "It feels excellent to inspire others, especially my children," she said. "And with this degree, I feel like I can do more. I feel like earning this shows my kids that this is an option for them." Nealy, who was able to graduate without any student loans due to scholarships and fellowships, is now a researcher and professor at Charles R. Drew University. Congratulations!

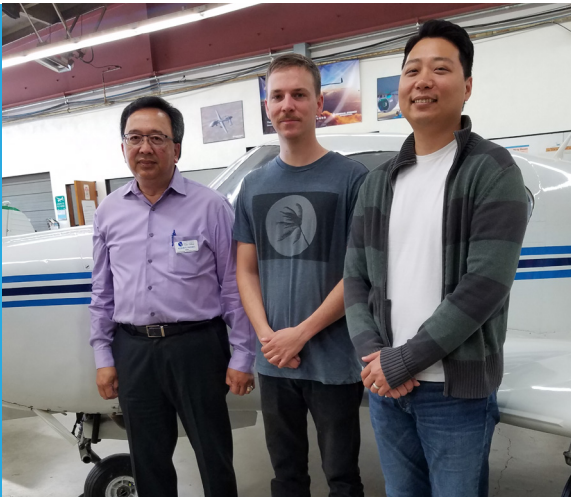




SBVC SNAPSHOTS

11 STEM Students Awarded \$94,000 in Scholarships

Eleven SBVC students have received a total of \$94,268 in scholarship funds from the S-STEM grant. The scholarships ranged from \$4,127 to \$6,000 per student. The students will meet regularly with a faculty mentor, participate in cohort classes their first year at CSUSB, and have access to a variety of co-curricular opportunities including peer mentoring, workshops & research.

Two Wolverines Named 'Athletes of the Year' in Foundation Awards

The SBVC Foundation recently announced distance runner Michael Ramirez as the Male Athlete of the Year, and women's soccer player Karen Jacobs as the Female Athlete of the Year. Jacobs was the Pacific Coast Athletic Conference's player of the year in 2018, leading the team on offense with team highs in goals (18) and assists (13). Jacobs has committed to continue her soccer career at Louisiana State University-Alexandria in the fall. Ramirez was the fastest Wolverine at the State Championships, as he earned All-American honors by finishing 10th.
