

## HALL OF FAME ALUMNUS RETURNS TO SBVC TO INSPIRE THE NEXT GENERATION OF SBVC ATHLETES



One number changed Tyree Washington's life: 44.52. It catapulted the Riverside native to stardom, taking him from the track at San Bernardino Valley College to the worldwide stage. 44.52 was the time he ran in 1997, when he broke the national record for 400 meters.

"It was the number two time in the world," Washington said. "I became this unknown to known athlete." It was all up from there. Washington went on to earn a bronze medal at the 1997 Outdoor World Championships and silver medals in the 200 and 400 meters at the 1998 Goodwill Games. In 2003, he was the Indoor World Champion for 400 meters, Outdoor World Champion for 400 meters, USA Indoor 400 meters champion, and World Outdoor silver medalist. Twice, Washington was the fastest man in the world.

Washington also excelled at football, and in the early 2000s was signed by the San Diego Chargers and picked up by the Oakland Raiders, but injuries derailed his time in the NFL. Now, he's bringing everything he learned from traveling the world and competing as a professional athlete to SBVC, where he is the new assistant coach for Track and Field.

Returning to SBVC "feels amazing," Washington said. "For me, Valley has always been home." To have this full circle moment and "come back and pass the baton to other students athletes, it's part of my mission in life, and I'm excited about it." As a coach, "you wear different hats," Washington said. Sometimes, he listens to them as if he's their father; other times, he's a therapist. "You're giving advice and leading them to the right direction, and equipping them with the right tools to be successful," he said. "I'm passing on what was given to me, and paying it forward."

She expressed a desire to inspire and encourage other female students to do the same, emphasizing that with faith and hard work, anything is possible.

By providing a safe and inclusive space for female students to connect and share their stories, the event helped to foster a sense of empowerment and solidarity among attendees. Veterans Resource Coordinator Jason Alvarez recognized that statistically the military is male dominated, but expressed, "our campus is diverse! We do have female veterans and it's important that the VRC is a place that is welcome to all."

#### WOMEN'S LUNCHEON BRINGS DIVERSE PROFESSIONAL GROUP TO CAMPUS





The event was organized by the college's Outreach team, led by Amanda Moody and Justine Plemons. The event kicked off at the SBVC Auditorium, where Interim President Dr. Linda Fontanilla and the executive team welcomed the seniors. Outreach Coordinator Justine Plemons shared that among the seniors surveyed, 77% enjoyed the event and 67% learned something valuable. "This is a testament to the relationships the SBVC Outreach Team have cultivated with our K-12 partners. The feedback among students and chaperones was overwhelmingly positive," shared Plemons.

#### LOCAL KINDERGARTNERS EXPERIENCE SBVC

KinderCaminata, a collaboration between SBVC and the San Bernardino City Unified School District, brought more than 1,200 students from 26 elementary schools to the SBVC campus. The event took place over six days in March and April, and organizers hope to make this an annual event. SBVC's Outreach team organized KinderCaminata, and Outreach Coordinator Amanda Moody said both teachers and administrators were "very happy" with how it turned out. "It was an amazing event," she added. "We hosted over 1,200 kindergarten students, who we hope will be future Wolverines."

During KinderCaminata, students viewed a STEM-MESA presentation and theater arts performance, and participated in events with SBVC mascot Blue.
