

# SBVC Named College of the Year for MAP/CPL Initiative

San Bernardino Valley College (SBVC) has been honored as the MAP College of the Year by the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office for its exceptional efforts in Credit for Prior Learning (CPL). This prestigious recognition celebrates SBVC's commitment to increasing educational access and career success for non-traditional students, including adult learners, veterans, and apprentices.

The award, presented at the CCCCO CPL Summit, underscores the impact of SBVC's innovative approach to helping students leverage their prior experiences to achieve their academic and professional goals. Congratulations to the dedicated MAP/CPL team—Dr. Stephanie Lewis, Demond Littles, Kevin Memminger, and Sylvia Romo—whose hard work has been instrumental in advancing this initiative.

SBVC's CPL program, a vital part of the California MAP (Mapping Articulated Pathways) Initiative, enables students to earn college credit for skills and knowledge gained outside the traditional classroom. These credits may be awarded for military service and training, industry-recognized credentials, or successful completion of exams such as the College-Level Examination Program (CLEP) and College Credit by Examination (DSST).

Through CPL, students can receive up to 45 units, significantly reducing the time and cost required to complete their degrees. This program has already made a measurable impact, with SBVC earning top rankings in metrics like Potential CPL Savings, 20-Year Impact, and overall College Metrics.

To date, SBVC's CPL associates have reviewed courses across 79 academic disciplines, ensuring a robust and continuously updated database of eligible classes. This initiative exemplifies the college's dedication to helping every student succeed by recognizing the value of their prior experiences.

This well-deserved recognition affirms SBVC's leadership in educational innovation, making it a model for other institutions across the state.

#### San Bernardino Valley College Hosts 3rd Annual Pharmacy 330 of 335 **Technology Day for Local High School Students**

On October 15, 2024, San Bernardino Valley College (SBVC) welcomed over 700 high school students from San Bernardino City Unified School District and Colton Joint Unified School District to its 3rd Annual Pharmacy Technology Day. The event provided students with a firsthand look at SBVC's Pharmacy Technology Training Pathway, a program that enables motivated high school students to earn college credits outside regular school hours. This unique pathway supports students aiming for pharmacy technician licensure and gives them a head start on a career in healthcare.

Students had the chance to connect with faculty and staff from SBVC and Loma Linda University's School of Pharmacy. Engaging hands-on demonstrations led by instructors introduced students to STEM concepts within pharmacy, creating an interactive learning experience that combined practical skills with scientific applications.

The highlight of the event was a guest speaker panel with staff from Loma Linda University School of Pharmacy. The speakers shared their personal insights into the profession and the vital role that an early college education played in providing benefit to students pursuing a pharmacy technology career. They also offered guidance for overcoming academic challenges as well as navigating the application process. Inspiring messages from Superintendent Arellano of San Bernardino City Unified School District and Mr. Fuentes, Colton Joint Unified School District Board Member, bolstered the message of encouragement for the student attendees.

Doris Ontiveros, Chair of the Pharmacy Technology Program, emphasized the importance of connecting students with core resources and employment opportunities. "It's essential to provide core resources and employment opportunities," she said. Over 30 local vendors were present, engaging with students about externships and career options within the pharmacy field at the Greek Theatre and along the Lois Carson Campus Center walkway.

Pharmacy Technology Day continues to be a valuable event for SBVC and local high schools, bridging the gap between high school education and career readiness in healthcare.

### SBVC's Dr. Nori Sogomonian-Mejía Selected for HACU Leadership Program

San Bernardino Valley College (SBVC) proudly announces that Dr. Nori Sogomonian-Mejía, a Spanish faculty member since 1994, has been chosen as one of 54 participants in the prestigious Enlace Mid-Level Leadership Program. Hosted by the Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities (HACU), this six-month initiative is designed to prepare mid-level professionals at Hispanic-Serving Institutions (HSIs) for leadership roles, with a focus on increasing Latino/a representation in higher education leadership.



Dr. Sogomonian-Mejía brings a wealth of academic and professional experience to the program. She earned her BA and MA in Spanish linguistics from UCLA, with additional studies in Mexico and Spain. In 1999, she received a Fulbright Scholarship and taught linguistics at the Central American University in Nicaragua. She later completed her Doctorate in Educational Leadership at California State University, San Bernardino, in 2011.

The Enlace Program provides training in areas like academic and student affairs management, diversity and inclusion, and higher education advocacy. It features online workshops and in-person sessions at HACU's Annual Conference in Colorado this November and the National Capitol Forum in Washington, D.C., next April.

Dr. Dina Humble, SBVC's Vice President of Instruction, emphasized the significance of this opportunity: "Dr. Sogomonian-Mejía's participation aligns with our mission to foster leadership that champions diversity and equity. We're excited for the impact this will have on our campus and community." The program is generously funded by Capital One and the Mellon Foundation, supporting participants' professional development and advancing equity in higher education.
