The 2013-14 academic year saw major policy changes from Sacramento as implementation of the Student Success Act, SB 1456

(passed in September 2012), came into full force. The bill mandated that all students see a counselor and fill out an Education Plan, in order to be or to remain, eligible for financial aid.

The bill also required that community colleges provide all the following services to students:

- assessment prior to course registration,
- orientation that includes explanations of campus procedures,
- · academic expectations and financial assistance,
- and any other services the college or district considers appropriate.

In any case, colleges must provide specialized support services that include, but are not limited to: federal, state, and local financial assistance; health services; career services; veteran support services; foster youth services; extended opportunity programs and services; campus child care services; programs that teach basic skills education and English as a second language; and disabled student services.

And I am proud to say that San Bernardino Valley College has been proactive in seeing that we serve our students in all these ways, and that we do so with a caring, helpful attitude that students here can sense and appreciate.

As you review this report on our progress and accomplishments for the 2013-14 academic year, rest assured that we are not resting at all. We are continuing to do everything we can to fulfill our mission of providing "quality education and services that support a diverse community of learners."

tudents are at the core of why San Bernardino Valley College exists. We are here to help them succeed in attaining their education and career goals. We do that in two primary ways. One of those is by offering courses along two primary tracks: vocational or career education and transfer preparation for those who want go on and pursue a four-year degree.

The second way is by providing a variety of support services that work outside the classroom to give students additional assistance so that they can continue to concentrate on their studies. Here is a list of the student support services that our college offers. As you can see this is an extensive list and one that we are proud to be able to offer.

Assessment Prior to Course Registration

Not all students who choose college are prepared for college-level coursework. Our assessment center tests incoming students on their English, math and reading skill levels. Depending on how they do, students may need to take courses that will help them catch up to where they need to be. We offer a number of classes in English as a Second Language, mathematics and reading designed to make sure that students succeed at college-level work.

Orientation

Especially for recent high school graduates or those who have been out of school for a while, coming to college can be a confusing experience. San Bernardino Valley College offers both online and on-ground orientation sessions so that incoming students know what to expect when it comes to things like financial aid and choosing courses—the really big issues, as well as such day-to-day issues as how to find your way around the campus and get a parking permit or bus schedule.

Academic Counseling

The State of California now requires that all students complete an Education Plan that outlines the courses they will take as they work toward a degree or certificate. Since the law requiring this was passed, San Bernardino Valley College has been working hard to insure that every student has such a plan on file. During the 2013-14 academic year SBVC's progress was 16% higher than the state average for community colleges, according to the California Community College Chancellor's Office.

Library & Learning Support Services

The Library houses a collection of over 80,000 volumes that can be searched through an online catalog. One or more copies of most textbooks used at SBVC are available for in-Library use through the "Textbook Bank."

In addition, the Library provides access to thousands of newspapers, magazines, e-books, journals and other materials. Enrolled students may request a password so that they can access online materials from their home computers.

The Library also houses an open computer laboratory, with over 100 personal computers. Multi-media equipment is available for student use in completing class assignments.

Bookstore

The San Bernardino Valley College bookstore stocks all the books and supplies students need for their courses. In addition students will find various refreshments, as well as an assortment of merchandise that includes apparel and gift items.

Cafeteria & Snack Bar

During the regular school year (fall and spring) students can choose to grab a snack from the campus snack bar, order a full mean at the campus cafeteria, or dine in style at "The Sun Room," where meals are provided by the college's award-winning culinary arts program for about the same price as a fast-food restaurant.

CalWORKS & Workforce Development

San Bernardino Valley College CalWORKs Program assists students who receive County CalWORKs support to enhance and achieve their educational goals and employment self-sufficiency. Qualified students are eligible to receive book vouchers, book loans, access to computer labs, parking permit vouchers, child care assistance, educational counseling, and employment assistance.

Child Development Center

The Child Development Center is open to the community and SBVC students with children. The center's mission is to provide high-quality child development experiences for infants up to 5-years-old.

The Center is monitored by the California State Department of Education and is subject to child care licensing regulations established by California's Department of Social Services for center-based care.

Disabled Student Programs and Services

Disabled Student Programs and Services (DSPS) provides a variety of services to enable students with disabilities to function independently in an educational environment. Most of the college's original buildings have been replaced with modern, state-of-the-art facilities that are fully ADA-compliant. The college's historic Auditorium is in the final stages of

a complete remodel and restoration that will make it fully accessible as well. We welcome all students with disabilities to beautiful San Bernardino Valley College, and hope that you will find the campus both accessible and friendly.

Extended Opportunities Program & Services (EOPS) and Cooperative Agencies Resources for Education (CARE)

San Bernardino Community College District recognizes that, as a result of financial need, language differences, and academic difficulties, some students will need special assistance for college success. The EOPS program is a state funded effort that provides special services to full time community college students. Participants must meet financial and educational disadvantage criteria. After eligibility requirements are met, EOPS services include the following: specialized academic, career, and personal counseling, book voucher/ loan, transportation assistance, priority registration, transfer assistance, special activities and workshops.

EOPS also offers Cooperative Agencies Resources for Education (CARE) to EOPS students who are single parents receiving TANF/CalWORKs with children under the age of 14. CARE services are in addition to what a student would receive as an EOPS student.

Financial Aid

San Bernardino Valley College (SBVC) offers a full array of financial aid programs, grants, work-study, loans and scholarships to full-time and parttime students.

The SBVC Financial Aid Office is committed to helping students with limited resources meet their educational expenses. We evaluate the student's financial ability to pay for educational costs in order to distribute limited resources in a fair and equitable manner.


Beginning Fall 2014, all financial aid awards will be disbursed on a special debit card known as the "Wolverine Card." Students will have their loan or grant funds disbursed electronically to their card account, which can be used like any other debit card.

Foster & Kinship Care Program/Foster Care/ILP

The Foster and Kinship Care Education Program provides quality education and support opportunities for care givers of children and youth in out-of-home care so that these providers may meet the educational, emotional, behavioral and developmental needs of children and youth.

Puente Program

The mission of the Puente Project is to increase the number of educationally underrepresented students who enroll in four-year colleges

and universities to obtain their bachelor's degrees and return to the community as leaders and mentors of future generations. Puente's Community College Program was established in 1981. Puente has been at SBVC since 1984. Puente is a successful statewide transfer program consisting of counseling, mentoring and writing components.

Students take two consecutive writing classes: English 015 (fall) and English 101 (spring). Students build confidence in their writing skills through an exploration of Mexican-American/Latino literature. Classes are linked with a one-unit class each semester: Student Development 015 and Student Development 101.

Remedial Courses

Specialized courses in English language skills, mathematics and reading are offered through various specialized programs on campus, such as Puente and Tumaini, as well as through the campus reading lab and student success center. These courses enable students to advance to college-level work so they can complete their career certificate or associate degree program as quickly as possible.

Success Through Achievement & Retention (STAR)

STAR provides opportunities for academic development, assists students with basic college requirements and serves to motivate students toward the successful completion of their AA/AS degree.

STAR staff focus on helping students meet their educational needs in a positive supportive setting so as to increase the college retention and graduation rates of its participants, and facilitate the process of transferring to a four-year university.

The SBVC STAR Program has been commended by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges Accreditation Committee.

Student Health Services

Student Health Services assists students in becoming and staying healthy so they are able to pursue their educational goals and enjoy their achievements. SHS provides both physical and mental health services. A Registered Nurse (RN) is always on call without an appointment during all open hours. Nurse Practitioners (NPs) are available by appointment to provide various medical services, including prescriptions.

Student Life

The Office of Student Life provides programs and services to enhance students' ability to learn and develop the life skills necessary to become productive and caring members of a global society. Student participation in the design and implementation of campus-wide programs provides

opportunities to develop and enhance leadership and interpersonal skills, while assisting personal growth. The office provides structured activities, programs, services, resources and facilities to accomplish this mission.

Associated Student Government (ASG) and a good number of on-campus clubs work hand-in-hand with Student Life to make sure there's plenty to do at SBVC besides attending classes!

STEM PassGo

STEM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics. The U.S. Department of Education awarded a grant to San Bernardino Valley College to provide support mechanisms to enhance success, completion, graduation and transfer rates of Hispanic students, low-income and underrepresented students in the STEM disciplines. Students are exposed to various experiences, including career awareness, soft skills education and internships. Students will participate in STEM activities, events, field trips and workshops that support and encourage students to persist in their chosen STEM majors.

SBVC partners with California State University, San Bernardino (CSUSB), to provide students with internships and scholarships at CSUSB.

Student Success Center

Student Success Center tutors help students become comfortable with course material and develop the learning strategies, confidence, and skills needed to become independent learners.

The Center specializes in mathematics, chemistry, biology, humanities and the social sciences. A Writing Center and Reading Lab provide assistance with writing or reading. There are also drop-in sessions available in a number of subjects, group tutoring workshops, supplemental instruction sessions and even one-to-one scheduled tutoring services.

Transfer and Career Services




SBVC is a great place to fulfill lower division general education as well as major preparation for transfer. Counselors assist students in developing education plans specifically designed to meet their transfer goals.

community designed to increase academic and personal success, and promote transfer to four-year colleges and universities. Tumaini targets students who are interested in learning about African-American history, literature, and culture. Tumaini instructors and counselors use collaborative and other community building strategies to enhance students' learning potential in and out of the classroom. The program combines elements of counseling and other courses (English, math) to assist students with the rigors of college life. Tumaini is open to all students.

Valley-Bound Commitment Program

The Valley-Bound Commitment Program at San Bernardino Valley College began as a pilot program for 36 students in 2008 and has blossomed into an award-wining program that has led to greater levels of student success for hundreds of Inland Empire residents. Valley-Bound participants achieve higher grades than their peers, continue their education beyond their first year at a higher rate than typical students, transfer to four-year colleges throughout California, and were student speakers at commencement. The program has served more than 776 students since 2008 and 215 new students will begin this year. The program is aimed at removing all economic barriers to the first year of college while providing critical guidance and support that are essential to achieving individual educational and career goals. Program funding is provided by the San Manuel Band of Mission Indians.

Veterans Resource Center

The Veterans Resource Center provides a supporting, encouraging, onestop destination for military veterans as they pursue their educational goals at SBVC.

Beyond a relaxed environment stocked with computers, the Veterans Affairs Office serves as a liaison between veteran students and the Department of Veteran Affairs. The office is equipped to



assist veteran students with the appropriate forms to process claims for educational benefits. The office is also an information center to assist with any questions concerning veteran educational benefits or educational experiences at San Bernardino Valley College.

dministrative Services makes sure that the physical and fiscal health of San Bernardino Valley College's infrastructure and resources are kept healthy as they can be. This past year has seen a good deal of progress with our bond-funded construction program, along with several other significant improvements



Highlights for the Year

Auditorium Renovation

This past year saw continuing progress on the college's construction master plan. By the end of the fiscal year renovations on our second oldest

building, the Auditorium, were on track to be completed by August. The building now meets the accessibility requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), thanks to the addition of an elevator tower at the rear of the building, an interior elevator from the auditorium floor up to stage level, and taking out some seats to provide wider, wheelchair-accessible aisles, along with special wheelchair seating platforms.

The men's and women's bathrooms were completely redone and expanded. All-new lighting and sound systems have been installed, the former basement work area is now up on the main floor backstage and the ceilings, floors and walls have all been cleaned and renovated. There are now two serviceable outdoor courtyards for special events.


Athletics Complex

The fences went up and a new campus map showed how to get around the construction site for our new athletics complex, with a formal groundbreaking scheduled for the fall semester, 2014. An all-new three-story gymnasium will be the first major step. The existing men's and women's gyms will remain open until the new one is ready to occupy.

Other Construction Bond Accomplishments

The remodel and expansion of the Business Building was completed in time for the Fall 2013 semester, as well as completion of the new Physical Plant facility. New security lighting was installed along K Street and our neighbors have expressed their happiness with the addition. We also completed the installation of an ACCESS bus shelter in parking lot 10. Sports field upgrades included fencing at the soccer field, discus pad and

backstop, and foul ball netting for the baseball field.

Affecting our longer term master plan, our contractor completed the design of phase 1 of retrofit work for the applied technology building.

Non-Bond Achievements

We finished a campus-wide exterior lighting retrofit to LED technology, taking advantage of over \$400,000 from state prop 39 energy funding. The more efficient lighting system should save over \$60,000/year.

We installed two Information Stations, which were campus funded.

Parking Restrictions Resolved

The college entered into a collaboration with the City of San Bernardino to coordinate parking restrictions on city streets and install a flashing crosswalk between Middle College High School and SBVC.

Other Highlights

A better organized Grounds program is now in place for improved campus aesthetics and curb appeal.

A collaboration with Associated Student Government resulted in installation of new water stations with bottle fillers in most campus buildings.

We established a campus Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) and established an active and meaningful budget committee.

Highlights for the Year

Applied Technology, Transportation & Culinary Arts Diesel

A new certificate program in Heavy/Medium Duty Diesel Truck has been approved by the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office



(CCCCO) in Sacramento. The goal of the certificate program is to prepare students for a career in the logistics of transportation. This certificate will provide students with industry-accepted safety instruction, knowledge of how to perform routine preventive maintenance and the ability to identify the causes and corrections of system failures, effectively communicating them verbally and in writing.

An application to offer an Associate of Science degree in Heavy/Medium Duty Diesel Truck Technology has also been submitted and is awaiting CCCCO's approval.

Water Supply Technology

Cucamonga Valley Water District (CVWD) partnered with SBVC's Water Supply Technology (WST) program to provide valuable experience for students enrolled in the WST work experience program. Working with a mentor at the water district, students appreciate the knowledge sharing and feel more confident in their skill levels after completing this course.

A grant from the National Science Foundation Advanced Technology Education (ATE) program allowed our program to produce an outreach event: Bridging the Water Divide: Training a New Generation of Water Technicians. Coordinator Peggy Weber and former CTE Articulation Coordinator Lizette Gambino, were able to visit 11 inland Empire high school sites and events during March and May.

In April approximately 100 counselors from Inland Empire school districts attended a Career Technical Conference at SBVC, which included a tour of





the Children's Development Center, the Art Department and the Applied Technology Building. We received over 30 Counselors interested in the CTE courses and programs offered in the various divisions who were delighted to see the hands-on training equipment and overview of the programs from our instructors.

Arts & Humanities Graphic Design Students

- Designed the third annual SBVC Film Festival poster.
- Designed the logo, flier, program, and table tents for a workshop on reducing student debt co-sponsored by Assemblywoman Cheryl Brown and the Alpha Gamma Sigma honor society.
- Designed the new logo for the online Arrowhead student newspaper.
- Designed a DVD cover for Rialto Rising, a youth development program supported by the Rialto Police Department.
- A student in Art 149 was awarded \$250.00 for her winning entry for a flier to encourage voter turnout sponsored by the Associated Student Government.

Photography Students

- Approximately 50 students enrolled in digital photography displayed their photographs in the Gresham Gallery as part of a Safety Art Month sponsored by the Campus Police Department. All of the photos had a safety theme.
- Approximately 50 students in digital photography participated in a collaborative event with the San Bernardino County Museum and California State University San Bernardino titled "Be Part of the Art." The students' photographs were on display at the San Bernardino County Museum during Spring 2014.

Student Art Show

The annual Student Art Show Reception took place on May 5, 2014, with over 200 works of art on display in the Gresham Gallery. Nineteen students had four or more pieces of their work accepted into the show and received Certificates



of Merit. Bryan Mount received the \$100 Kiwanis of Rialto Award, and Andrew Woodyard received the \$250 Beryl Larkin Award. Four students, Niki Arce, Matthew Sodergaski, Jessica Rodriguez, and Marcella Moya received \$175.00 Tom Akin Awards. Thirteen students received Friends of the Gallery and Art Club Awards. Recipients of awards in the amount of \$50 and \$100 were Marissa Gardner, Miguel Urruita, Tagi Fong, Michael Toro, Alisha Kottwitz, and Gloria Posada, Oscar Landin, Jose Landin, Andrea Monteon, and Margarita Esparza.

Mathematics, Business & Computer Technology

As a division, we have made great strides to help current SBVC students as well as potential students from our local High Schools to achieve their goals of higher education. We have been working with the Alliance of Education, San Bernardino City Unified School District, Colton Joint Unified School District, Rialto Unified School District, Redlands Unified School District and Yucaipa-Calimesa Joint Unified School District to establish pathways in division programs through presentations, community cabinet participation, one-on-one meetings with principals and superintendents and collaborative events both on and off campus. Here are specific program activities:

AB86 - Adult Education Regional Consortium

We have established the Inland AB86 Regional Consortium to help with planning for adult education in our region of San Bernardino County. We have established collaborative partnerships with nearby K-12 districts and adult education resources, which has led to students transitioning into San Bernardino Valley College and Crafton Hills College.





A website has been established for current information on partnership institutions, with up-to-date contacts and program details. The address is http://www.inlandab86.org. Social network sites like Twitter and Facebook have been established to ensure information availability and transparency of the project.

Student Success Center - HSI STEM Pass-Go Project

We have made substantial improvements to the Student Success Center, resulting in better student tracking and improved student awareness of opportunities for learning and tutorial services. Utilization of the Student Success Center has increased steadily. For 2011-12, there were 20,295 hours of STEM tutoring. For 2012-2013, the total was 21,451 hours and for 2013-2014, the total was 22,683 hours.

A new website includes details of STEM offerings at SBVC, staff information, event registration and an application to join the SBVC STEM program. The address is http://www.sbvcstem.org. Social network sites like Twitter, Facebook, and Instagram have been established to ensure student follow-up and information availability is capable.

Pre-Assessment workshops have been very successful and are now integrated into the recruitment process during the Spring semester. In addition, we are working with surrounding K-12 and adult education institutions to establish curriculum sharing and workshops to ensure that incoming students have the necessary knowledge level in mathematics to be successful college students who persist.

Event planning has evolved to include K-12 partners, community businesses and campus faculty, leading to improved event participation from all involved. We have also included programs in Career & Technical Education (CTE) and Computer Information Technology (CIT) that will give our STEM students job opportunities through projects and programs established by the HSI STEM Pass-Go Project Team.

Science

The Psychiatric Technician Program was rated number one in the state for

the passing rate of students on the state exam.

The Science Division hosted around 200 eighth graders for Science and Technology Day on May 2nd.

The Nursing Program completed their accreditation process with the Board of



Registered Nursing and was re-accredited.

A Minority Science Engineering Improvement Program grant allowed us to fund stipends for four of our STEM students to participate in a summer research experience at the University of California, Riverside.

Division Sponsored Events with HSI STEM Pass-Go:

On April 11th STEM and the Division of Mathematics, Business and Computer Technology participated in the High School Counselors Workshop through the SBVC Counseling Office where HSI STEM staff and the Division Dean rolled out the Inaugural STEM Track/STEM Express Programs.

On April 25th HSI STEM PASS GO hosted the Annual Women in Mathematics and Science event, which highlights the achievements and contributions of women in the STEM fields. Over 200 young high school, middle college and SBVC students attended the event.

On June 21st STEM participated in the Foster Care & Kinship event at SBVC sponsored by SBVC Outreach & Recruitment. Foster parents attending the event received information about STEM initiatives, support services, and opportunities.

On June 30th the inaugural STEM program orientations yielded increased interest by SBVC students in STEM Express and Track programs. The orientations focused on program offerings, family involvement, STEM transfer services and academic pathways.

Social Sciences, Human Development & Physical Education Athletics

Child Development Center

The SBVC Child Development Department continues to play an integral role in the Inland Empire child development community. With activities conducted on and off campus the department continues to be a catalyst for services provided to both public and private child care programs. The following highlights represent a snapshot of our programs for 2014.

The California Early Childhood Mentor Program provides access to education and professional development opportunities for classroom teachers and program administrators. This year our program had three certified teacher mentors, two director mentors and six mentees.

In partnership with our local resource and referral agency, the Child Care Resource Center, and Teddy Bear Tymes (one of the longest serving child care programs in the Inland Empire) the department was able to draw on the expertise of our Child Development and Psychology faculty (full-time and adjunct) to present topics impacting child development programs both public and private. Attendance at our Director's Meeting range from 25 to 60 participants each month.

The Child Development Department also administers a small grant (\$12,500) from the Child Development Training Consortium that provides SBVC students with funding to assist them in completing the required courses needed to obtain a Child Development Permit. This year 68 students participated in the CDTC program, attempting a total of 629.5 units and completing 569.5 units for a completion rate of 90.5%. Each student received tuition assistance in the form of a stipend in the amount of \$22.03 for each completed unit. We received \$12,500 from the CDTC with \$11,577.94 going directly to students and the remaining \$922.06 to the District to cover indirect costs.

Child Development faculty visited over 50 child development students and their facilities this semester through our lab and observation courses.

According to figures provided by Admissions and Records there were 97 Child Development Certificates and Degrees awarded for the 2013-2014 academic year including summer school. This represents an increase over the degrees and certificates awarded in 2012-2013. 2013/2014 SBVC Foundation

On May 7, 2014, the Foundation hosted nearly 500 family members, donors, members of the campus community and friends of the college at an awards ceremony at which 265 students were awarded \$173,000 in scholarships for registration fees and textbooks.

2014 Golf Tournament

On Friday, May 10, 2014 the Foundation hosted the 4th Annual Golf Tournament at Yucaipa Valley Golf Club, benefiting student scholarships and our athletic programs. Yucaipa Mayor Denise Hoyt, SBVC student athletes and our Wolverine mascot welcomed the golfers. This event proved to be our best yet, raising \$21,605. The generosity of our alumni, corporate sponsors and board members helped make this a rewarding and memorable afternoon.

Alumni Portal

New this year, the Foundation initiated an "Alumni Portal" for SBVC alumni to reconnect with the college and the Foundation. As a result, the number of alumni association members increased more than 200%. The Inland Empire has one of the lowest college-going rates in the state. In response, the Valley Bound Program began in 2008 with the aim of helping high school students in the area escape this trend. During the first year, 31 students were served from one local high school. Since then the program has grown considerably and now serves 215 students from 13 local high schools.

Graduates of this program have moved on to attend four-year degree programs and full time employment within our community. The program's success and the success of our students, are due to the strong partnership that has been forged between the San Manuel Band of Mission Indians and San Bernardino Valley College Foundation.





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
