

SBVC First to Offer Accelerated Electronics Technology Program

SBVC becomes the first and the only community college in San Bernardino County to offer an Accelerated Electronics Technology Program. This new and exciting program offers an Electronics Technology certificate in 8 months, preparing students for careers in the field of electrical, computer, communications and electronic engineering technicians. The Accelerated Electronics Technology Program is designed to give students a complete understanding of the basic and intermediate foundations of Electronics Engineering Technology. It was formulated with inputs from various electronics and electrical contractors, and is taught by instructors with real-world experience.








Student success is at the core of why San Bernardino Valley College exists. We are here to help students succeed in attaining their educational goals, whether in the pursuit of a career certificate, an associate degree, or to transfer to a bachelor's degree program. The Student Services Unit provides a variety of developmental & support services that work outside the classroom to give students additional assistance so that they can continue to concentrate on their studies.

Assessment Prior to Course Registration

Our assessment center tests incoming students on their English, math and reading skill levels. We offer a number of classes in English as a Second Language, mathematics and reading designed to make sure that students succeed at college-level work.





Orientation

SBVC offers both online and on-ground, in-person orientation sessions so that incoming students know what to expect with financial aid, choosing courses, parking permits, bus schedules, & more!

Financial Aid

San Bernardino Valley College offers a full array of financial aid programs, grants, work-study, loans and scholarships to full-time and part-time students. The SBVC Financial Aid Office is committed to helping students with limited resources meet their educational expenses. This year, SBVC disbursed over \$17.8 million in financial aid to students, and awarded \$224,189 in scholarships.

Transfer and Career Services

The SBVC Transfer and Career Services Center assists students with a smooth transition to university life by providing counseling services, information, and assistance. Transfer counselors are available to assist students in developing educational plans specifically designed to meet transfer goals. Special events include transfer and college fairs, field trips to different universities around the country, and various workshops to assist students with informational and application needs. This center assists students in making informed and educated decisions regarding their career assessment, career exploration, and job search assistance.

Bookstore

The San Bernardino Valley College bookstore stocks all the books and supplies students need for their courses. In addition, students will find various refreshments, as well as an assortment of merchandise that includes apparel and gift items.

Library & Learning Support Services

The Library houses a collection of over 80,000 volumes that can be searched through an online catalog. One or more copies of most textbooks used are available for in-Library use through the "Textbook Bank." The Library also houses an open computer laboratory, with over 100 personal computers. Multimedia equipment is available for student use in completing class assignments.

Child Development Center

The Child Development Center is open to the community and SBVC students with children. The center's mission is to provide high-quality child development experiences for infants up to 5-years-old. The Center is monitored by the California State Department of Education and is subject to child care licensing regulations established by California's Department of Social Services for center-based care.

San Bernardino Valley College Foundation

Foundation is a fundraising organization committed to the stewardship of assets and the development of relationships to advance the vision of SBVC.. This organization awards over \$200,000 in scholarships annually to students for enrollment fees, books and supplies.



SBVC Adopts Urbita Elementary School

On December 6, San Bernardino Valley College officially adopted Urbita Elementary School during a special ceremony on campus. It was the first time a San Bernardino City Unified School Distrid school adoption was held away from the school's campus, with all 400 of Urbita's students riding the bus to SBVC, where they were treated to a ballet and short theater produdion. Long before the adoption was formalized, SBVC has welcomed Urbita Elementary students to its campus, where they have participated in various adivities aimed at inspiring them to do well in school and go to college, said San Bernardino Valley College President Diana Rodriguez. "We are publicly acknowledging and celebrating the close partnership that has developed between Urbita and SBVC faculty and administrators," Rodriguez said. "SBVC has been an extension of Urbita's academic environment for many years, and many Urbita alumni have gone on to SBVC to complete their college education. We are thankful for our partnership with Urbita and the SBCUSD and hope that it continues to grow stronger."



SBVC Unveils 'Valley 360 Resource Center

San Bernardino Valley College unveiled its first-ever resource center for homeless and needy students, named the Valley 360 Resource Center for its potential to provide 360 degrees of support for students during their acadmic pursuits at SBVC. The resource center will provide meals, clothing, and baby items for hundreds of San Bernardino Valley College students who will need them most, allowing them to focus more time on their studies and on completing the degree or certificate that will lead them to employment in the high-paying career of their dreams. This resource center is made possible through the generosity of the Community Action Partnership of San Bernardino, as well as the work of SBVC's Administrative Services division, which prepared the facility for operation, and the Student Services division, which operates and staffs the center.



Diana Z. Rodriguez Named 2018 'Woman of the Year'

Diana Z. Rodriguez, President of SBVC, was named 2018 Woman of the Year by California's 47th Assembly District today at a special ceremony in the State Capitol. She was presented with the award by Assemblymember Eloise Gómez Reyes, who is herself an SBVC alumna. "Diana is a perfect example of a champion for the Inland Empire," said Reyes in an announcement on her Facebook page. The 2018 Woman of the Year Award, which recognizes women in the 47th Assembly District for accomplishments in their respective fields and for their dedication to improving the lives of others, received fifty-two nominations from throughout the community. Nominees came from a variety of different backgrounds, ranging from educators and community advocates to county employees, students, business owners and heads of local nonprofits.






SBVC Recognized as Strong Workforce Star

In March 2018, San Bernardino Valley College was awarded 17 silver and bronze "Strong Workforce Stars" by the California Community College Chancellor's Office to recognize it for increasing graduate earnings by up to 551%, as well as for helping students to attain a regional living wage and find employment in their field of study. "Strong Workforce Stars" is an annual recognition for career education programs within the California Community Colleges system whose graduates show significant gains in factors important for advancing social mobility: a substantial increase in earnings, attainment of a living wage and a job closely matched with the field of study. Among the stars awarded, SBVC's psychiatric technology program was lauded for increasing student earnings by 551%, with 96% of graduates attaining the regional living wage. SBVC's nursing program increased earnings by 53%, with 83% of graduates attaining the regional living wage.





Student Health Services

The Student Health Center offers a variety of physical and mental services to keep students healthy and thriving. Registered nurses are available for walk-in visits, counselors offer individual appointments, and nurse practitioners can be met with for examinations and prescriptions. San Bernardino Valley College offers free mental health and crisis intervention oriented counseling, with a variety of clinicians available to assist students including licensed clinicians, interns, and trainees. Students can also receive physical services, such as lab work, immunizations, health check-ups, and vaccines, at little to no cost.







Civil Rights Icon Dolores Huerta Speaks to Hundreds at SBVC

San Bernardino Valley College hosted labor leader and civil rights activist Dolores Huerta in an event titled Si Se Puede: A Dialogue with Dolores Huerta. This free event that was open to the public drew hundreds of campus and community members to the SBVC Auditorium to hear her speak about issues regarding politics, education, immigration, and women's rights. The day's events concluded with a screening of the documentary "Dolores". The film, detailing the life and achievements of Huerta, was specially screened by KVCR in the campus's Library Viewing Room. Bruce Baron, San Bernardino Community College District chancellor, called the day celebrating Huerta a "historic moment" for the college and for the district.











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
