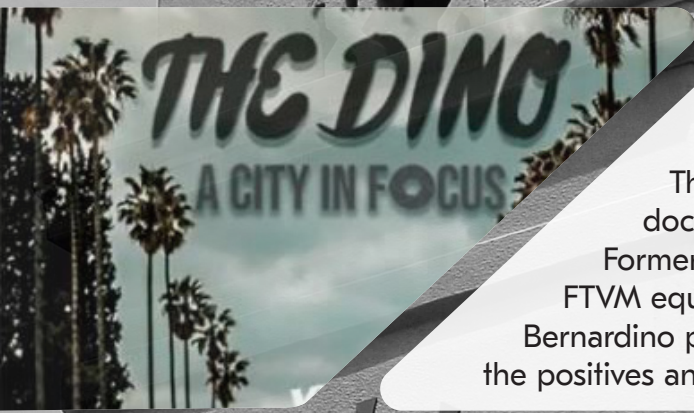


SBVC Awarded ~\$300,000 in Grants to Support VBC Program

The San Bernardino Valley College Foundation was awarded by the San Manuel Band of Mission Indians a grant in the amount of \$299,925. The funds were designated to enhance and expand support of the Valley-Bound Commitment Program, which aims to remove all economic barriers to first-year college students while providing critical guidance and support essential to their academic goals.

RTVF Department Updated its Name and Launched Institute of Media Arts

In the fall of 2020, San Bernardino Valley College changed the name of its Radio, Television and Film program to Film, Television and Media to be more representative of its comprehensive media programs and services. The department also launched a new Institute of Media Arts (IMA), replacing the IEMA, and showcasing more art, music and theater and film programs.



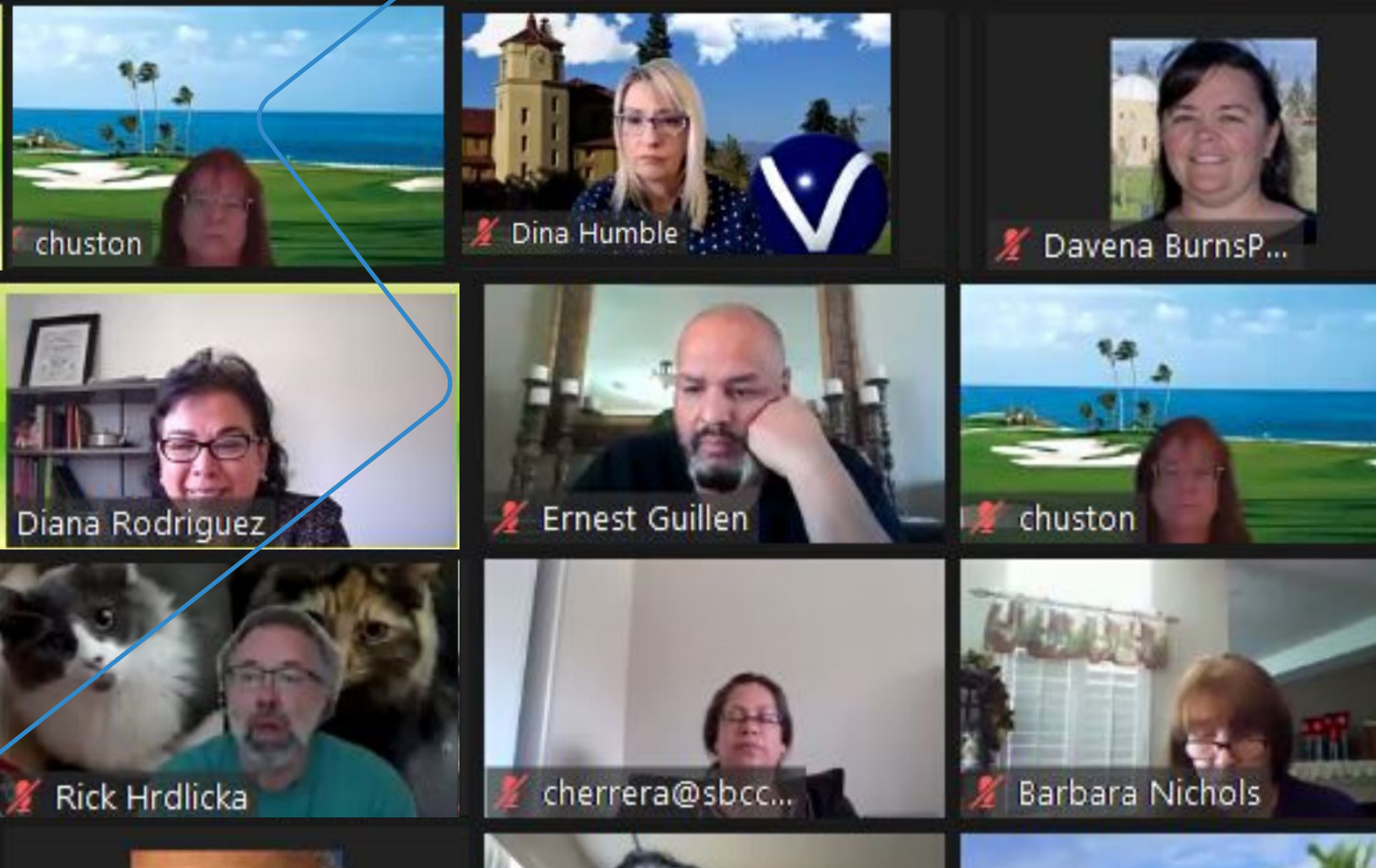
Amazon Prime Streamed Winning SBVC Student Film

The FTVM program at SBVC helped guide an alumnus to create a documentary that has made its way to Amazon Prime for viewing. Former Wolverine Daniel Saldaña directed *The Dino: A City in Focus* with FTVM equipment and faculty guidance. The documentary follows local San Bernardino photographers who use their cameras to capture the city, with both the positives and the negatives of the community and area.

Edison Granted SBVC \$75,000 to Support Electric Vehicle Education

Edison International awarded the San Bernardino Valley College Foundation \$75,000 to support SBVC's Clean Energy Hybrid and Electric Vehicle (EV) Technician Program, as well as STEM scholarships for students. The EV program aims to increase the availability of electric vehicle training and help develop skills necessary for higher-wage job opportunities in the field.





San Bernardino Valley College Adopted Anti-Racism/ No Hate Education

San Bernardino Valley College gave employees the anti-racism resources necessary to ensure all campus members are treated equally and fairly. In the wake of the protests sparked by the death of George Floyd in Minneapolis, SBVC President Diana Z. Rodriguez held an open discussion with faculty and staff on Black Lives Matter, and actions SBVC can take to support the movement going forward. Faculty and staff members participated in online workshops and trainings on unconscious bias, micro-aggressions, and ways to better connect with students of color. In late June, the SBVC Academic Executive Committee passed an emergency resolution outlining the infusion of anti-racism/no hate education into the curriculum. Formal curriculum changes included adding diversity and multiculturalism to degree requirements, which will be implemented next academic year. Virtual events included professional development activities that "help us as educators learn how systemic racism has occurred on our campus and what we can do to change it," said Academic Senate President Dr. Amy Avelar. "We can even reflect on how we were taught and what was excluded. There could be activities on learning different techniques to incorporate anti-racism/no-hate education within disciplines that may have previously been thought as difficult or impossible to incorporate." The district had an equal opportunity employment plan, student equity strategies, and policies affirming the importance of diversity, and the forum's goal was to let the Chancellor's Cabinet hear directly from employees on ways the district can ensure students and workers feel safe, respected, and valued.




SBVC Awarded \$348,000 to Support Low-Income Students

State Congressman Pete Aguilar announced that San Bernardino Valley College received a \$348,000 grant from the Department of Education's Student Support Services (SSS) grant program. The program provides funding to colleges for financial aid, tutoring and academic counseling to students who are low-income, have disabilities or other disadvantages.

SBVC Introduced Live Chat Feature to Expand Virtual Student Services

The Student Services division launched a live Chabot to assist students in real time seeking guidance. Current and prospective students could visit the school website and get assistance from a live SBVC representative about topics that range from how to apply to campus, how to make a counseling appointment, or how to reach a faculty member.




Student Services Launched Online Welcome Center

The Welcome Center, which has long provided assistance to current and prospective students on all things SBVC, took its services to the virtual world. The updated Welcome Center webpage gave students the option to join a Zoom call and remotely participate in its Information Table. Existing students could also ask their general questions by scheduling an appointment with a Welcome Center ambassador.

SBVC Teamed Up with Crafton Hills College for Disability Awareness Fair

San Bernardino Valley College and Crafton Hills College joined forces to ensure that students with disabilities know all of the resources available to them on both campuses. The Third Annual Disability Awareness Fair was held virtually for the first time, and included various guest speakers discussing assistive technology and disability rights.



SBVC Included in Historic \$100 Million Donation for Emergency Scholarships

San Bernardino Valley College was part of a historic \$100 million donation to California community colleges by the Jay Pritzker Foundation, along with 34 fellow colleges in the Inland Empire, Central Valley and Far North of the state. The unprecedented donation, the largest ever made to a community college system, will be distributed over a 20-year period and is intended to help eliminate regional educational gaps through distribution of emergency financial aid to students facing unexpected hardships and scholarships to students who are well on their way toward a finish line goal of transferring to a college or university or completing a certificate or degree. "We are immeasurably thankful to the Jay Pritzker Foundation for their generosity to our students and community," said SBVC President Diana Z. Rodriguez. "Although many barriers to higher education attainment persist in our region, this gift will help us come closer to overcoming those barriers and continuing San Bernardino Valley College's 94-year legacy of helping our students build their dreams." Colleges receiving the funding can use it to provide emergency financial aid of up to \$18,500 per student, per year to cover a wide range of education-related expenses.





SBVC Distributed Over \$6.6 Million in CARES Act Relief for Students in Need

Using money allocated through the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act and Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF), San Bernardino Valley College was able to offer direct aid assistance to students, purchase personal protective equipment, and secure an online navigation system that connects students with mental health care resources. SBVC received allocations for direct student aid, institutional aid, and minority-serving institution support. By fall of 2020, \$2,841,000 had been distributed to 3,336 eligible students, with the amounts varying based on enrollment status. By the end of the spring semester, \$6.6 million of additional funding was allocated to over 5,500 students in need. The institutional aid was used to purchase anti-viral cleaning and sanitation supplies, hot spots/internet service, laptops, service subscriptions to support online learning, and personal protective equipment for students and employees. SBVC used the minority-serving institution funds to offer students access to Care Solace, a web-based tool that connects them with mental health care resources and providers in the community. The San Bernardino Valley College Foundation also donated \$180,000 to SBVC, with \$5,000 covering transfer fees and the rest going into an emergency fund for all students, with priority given to those not covered by the CARES Act, including undocumented students.



SBVC Partnership Expanded Water Technology Program

West Valley Water District Board of Directors President Channing Hawkins and San Bernardino Valley College President Diana Rodriguez signed a Memorandum of Understanding to create paid or non-paid and part-time or full-time internships and jobs in the water technology field. The program will provide skills, training, and job placement in a steady, growing field to the people of the Inland Empire.



Holiday Gathering Raised Record Amount for Student Scholarships

Over 200 staff and faculty members of SBVC participated in the Annual President's Holiday Gathering, with 26 gift baskets donated by various campus programs and departments. The virtual event fundraising resulted in \$7,108 raised for student scholarships, making it one of the most financially successful Holiday Gatherings in campus history.



MEChA and SCTA Distributed 350 Thanksgiving Food Bags

San Bernardino Valley College's MEChA and Student California Teacher Association provided more than 350 bags of food to community members in need during Thanksgiving. For 23 years, the groups have collected donations of packaged food and nonperishable canned goods from SBVC students and staff members during the holidays, and distributed them to San Bernardino families in need.



SBVC Ranked #3 Most Affordable Out-of-State Online College

San Bernardino Valley College was ranked among the most affordable online out-of-state colleges in the United States. CollegeStats.org, a higher education data collection and analysis website, released its annual ranking of the least-expensive online out-of-state colleges, ranking SBVC third in the country in terms of cost-per-unit and financial aid assistance.



SBVC Connected with High Schoolers through Phone App

Through a new mobile messaging platform, San Bernardino Valley College was able to seamlessly connect with high school students in the local community, guiding them through the college process. The communication platform, developed by Siembra, directly links SBVC via text messaging to prospective students and their parents in the San Bernardino, Colton, and Rialto school districts.



SBVC Instructor Earns Master Pilot Award for 50+ Years in Aeronautics

SBVC instructor Larry Rice was recognized with the Federal Aviation Administration's Wright Brothers Master Pilot Award, given to pilots who have practiced safe flight operations for 50 years or more. He attended SBVC when he was 18 years old, where he joined the SBVC Flying Club. He is now an adjunct professor on campus, teaching private pilot, instrument, and weather classes.



SBVC Enhanced Anti-Racism Efforts With Equity Workshops

Through the Supporting Equitable Learning Environments Virtual Series, San Bernardino Community College District employees participated in webinars to help them implement equity-minded practices in the classroom and through online instruction. This virtual series was part of an Inland Empire/Desert Regional Consortium (IEDRC) Strong Workforce Program regional project, and aimed to continue the campus' effort to be actively anti-racist.



SBVC's 'Wolverine Telehealth' Provided 24/7 Virtual Medical Services

Through the new Wolverine Telehealth Program, San Bernardino Valley College students could speak to a doctor or mental health specialist whenever necessary, free of charge. SBVC was the first college in the Inland Empire to partner with 24HOURDOCS, and allowed students to use their mobile device, tablet, or computer to see a doctor by video or talk by phone.

SBVC Ranked #1 Most Affordable Community College in California

According to [communitycollegereview.com](https://www.communitycollegereview.com), SBVC was ranked the most affordable community college in California for the 2020–2021 school year. In a typical academic year, most SBVC students receive financial aid grants and scholarships, and over 97% avoid taking on any student loan debt while attending. With nearly \$33 million in grants, scholarships, and other financial aid distributed annually, SBVC students can access high-quality, affordable education that propels them into high-paying careers. SBVC President Diana Rodriguez said the college has prioritized providing an affordable and accessible education for students of San Bernardino and the Inland Empire. “Our mission is to ensure that all students who truly wish to achieve their educational and career goals with us here at SBVC are able to do so, regardless of their income,” Rodriguez said. “We are proud to be the most affordable community college in the state, and make our communities as equitable and accessible as possible.”





Machinist Technology Installed State-of-the-Art Technology

San Bernardino Valley College has the oldest machinist training facility in the Inland Empire, and this year celebrated its 75th anniversary. The program received pieces of new equipment, including an electric servo press, vertical machining center, CNC lathe, and electric discharge machine, were purchased with Strong Work Force grant money and will help students get hands-on training with state-of-the-art equipment.

SBVC Launched First-Ever Mandarin Chinese Language Program

This spring, San Bernardino Valley College opened to students the opportunity to learn a language spoken by hundreds of millions of people around the world: Mandarin Chinese. This beginning course will help students develop competence in listening, speaking, reading, and writing as they learn basic vocabulary, sentence structures, and characters.



SBVC Observed Black History Month with Virtual Series

San Bernardino Valley College commemorated Black History with a virtual guest speaker series that included Kim Gardner, Circuit Attorney of St. Louis; Dr. Afiya Mbilishaka, CEO of PSYCHOHAIRAPY; and author and medical ethicist, Harriet Washington. The events were presented by the SBVC Arts, Lectures & Diversity Committee and the SBCCD Black Faculty and Staff Association and aimed to highlight the Black experience.

Equity, Inclusion & Anti-Racism Committee Formed at SBVC

San Bernardino Valley College's Committee on Equity, Inclusion & Anti-Racism was formed to ensure the campus is a safe and welcoming place for every member of the community, where people feel respected, seen, and heard. The committee's goal is to look at the institution's practices, policies, and processes with a critical eye and through an equity minded lens.





SBVC Received the Highest Level of Accreditation from the ACCJC

San Bernardino Valley College received the highest level of accreditation an institution can receive by the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior College (ACCJC). Based on its results of a virtual inspection and evaluation, the ACCJC reaffirmed SBVC's accreditation for seven years, with no additional follow-up needed. SBVC completed a series of virtual accreditation visits, a process that only happens every seven years. This comprehensive review by the ACCJC evaluated the campus to ensure it is providing exceptional education, promoting effectiveness, and continuously improving its processes. The ACCJC accreditation process provides assurance to the public that the accredited member colleges meet its set of standards. The ACCJC visiting team expressed "appreciation for the diligent work and thoughtful reflection that San Bernardino Valley College undertook to prepare for this evaluation." SBVC, which has been reaffirmed for the next seven years, received special praise from the accrediting commission for leadership in serving the needs of students in three specific areas. The first was its Valley 360 Resource Center, which provides food or other resources to registered students in need. Secondly was its Generation Go! program, which provides career services and mentoring to youth ages 16 to 24. Lastly was its Middle College High School partnership, which provides a way for students to earn college credit while still in high school.

SBVC Foundation Raised Nearly One Million Dollars to Support Students

Over \$960,000 was raised to help SBVC students both in response to the pandemic and to support them into the Fall 2021-Spring 2022 academic year. A donation from the Jay Pritzker Foundation enabled the Finish Line Scholars Program to award \$150,000. The SBVC Foundation contributed \$180,000 for emergency financial aid, allocating \$70,000 for undocumented students and \$5,000 for student transfer fees. The Inland Empire Community Foundation awarded \$20,000 to be used for student emergency aid, and the Foundation for California Community Colleges Student Relief Fund for Foster Youth awarded \$10,665 to help 29 current or former foster youth. The Growing Inland Achievement donated \$15,000, and SBVC's Association of Student Government donated \$30,000 to purchase hotspot devices with 12-month data plans. The Valley-Bound Commitment Program students received emergency financial relief after the San Manuel Band of Mission Indians repurposed more than \$60,000 of grant funds to provide emergency financial aid to Valley-Bound students enrolled this semester. The Wells Fargo Foundation repurposed a \$25,000 grant to buy Chromebooks that were loaned out to Valley-Bound Program students who needed access to a computer. Over \$75,000 was awarded by Southern California Edison, including \$50,000 that will support the SBVC's Clean Energy Hybrid and Electric Vehicle (EV) Technician Training program and award \$1,000 scholarships to 5 students in the program. Other program support funding came from a \$25,000 grant from the So Cal Gas Company to expand SBVC's EV Tech Program (hydrogen) at Automotive & Diesel. Finally, a \$20,000 grant from the San Bernardino County Nonprofit Assistance Fund was awarded to the SBVC Foundation.

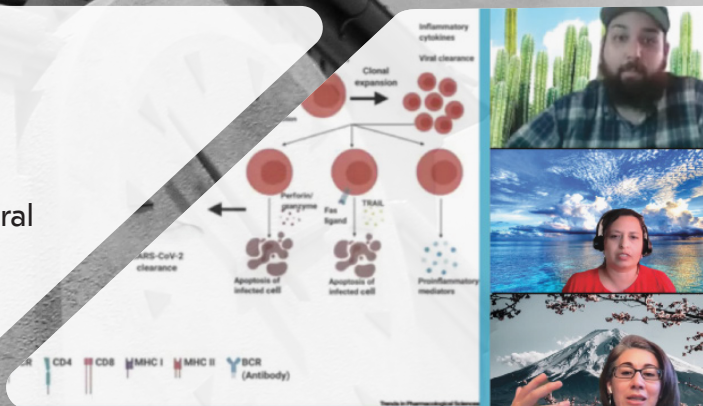


SBVC Ranked in 'Top 20' for Online Computer Science Degree

According to TheBestSchools.org, SBVC was among the top 20 best choices for a student seeking an associate degree in computer science in a virtual format. Students can earn either an associate degree or certificate in computer science at SBVC, both of which cover a wide range of topics in the computer science realm, emphasizing software engineering and information processing.

COVID-19 Forums Informed and Empowered Local Community

San Bernardino Valley College hosted a series of informational forums that addressed COVID-19 and the racial, ethnic and cultural disparities in public health and vaccination availability. The event aimed to provide a space for community members to converse about the unique concerns of minority groups, while also providing factual information about the pandemic.



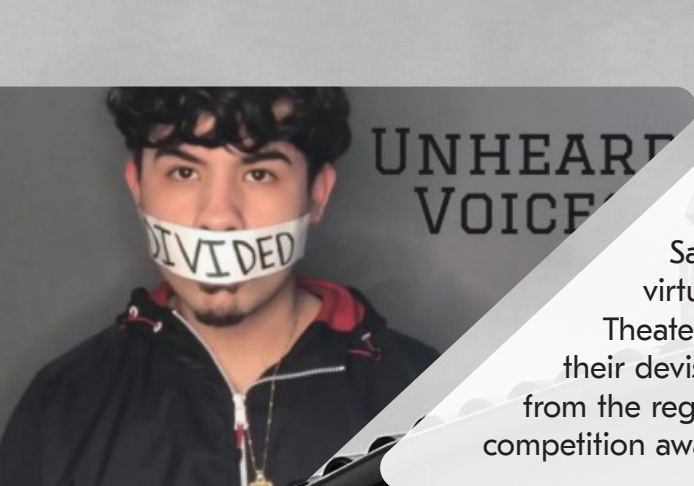
SBVC Won a National Marketing Excellence Award

SBVC was recognized for its outstanding marketing and communications work alongside companies including Amazon, ESPN Films, Macy's, PepsiCo Design and Innovation, Forbes Media and Savvy. SBVC won the 2020 Communicator Award for Excellence in the 'non-profit integrated campaign' category with its summer/fall 2019 enrollment campaign that aimed to boost enrollment and retention.

SBVC Launched New Apprenticeship Opportunities for Students

San Bernardino Valley College partnered with LAUNCH Apprenticeship Network to offer students real-world experience with full-time and paid positions. Each apprenticeship lasts for one or two years, and students attend Career Technical Education (CTE) certificate/degree classes while working full-time in paid positions that correlate with their selected career pathway.





Students Recognized at Kennedy Theater Festival

San Bernardino Valley College's theater arts stars were able to virtually dazzle the judges at the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival. Seven students competed in the February event, and their devised piece, *Unheard Voices*, was one of three pieces selected from the region to be presented at the festival. The students won various competition awards in areas like stage management and costume design.

\$150,000 in Finish Line Funds Awarded to Assist SBVC Students

The SBVC Foundation was awarded \$150,000 for the Finish Line Scholars Program, an initiative that provides scholarships and assistance to students who are close to finishing their degree, certificate, or transfer studies within two years. The combined funds will be used towards nearly 100 scholarships over the next academic year for eligible students in financial need.

Wolverine Con Garner a Global Audience Virtually

San Bernardino Valley College's Institute of Media Arts wrapped another successful Wolverine Con International Student Film Festival, held March 31 to April 3. The festival, which was held virtually, featured a cosplay contest, panel discussions with SBVC faculty and industry professionals, film screenings from students all over the world and SBVC, and an awards ceremony for winning films.

SBVC Foundation Awarded Over \$360,000 in Student Scholarships

On May 5, the SBVC Foundation distributed 636 scholarships to 443 students, totaling more than \$360,000, with 125 students receiving multiple awards. The SBVC Foundation scholarships are funded by dozens of campus and community donors and organizations, with many in honor of former San Bernardino Valley College students, staff, and faculty members.





President Diana Z. Rodriguez Became 16th Chancellor of SBCCCD

The San Bernardino Community College District (SBCCD) Board of Trustees announced the appointment of San Bernardino Valley College President Diana Z. Rodriguez as the district's 15th Chancellor. Rodriguez will lead the mission of a system that serves 20,000 students through Crafton Hills College, San Bernardino Valley College, a workforce training facility, and KVCR TV/FM. Rodriguez is poised to become the only Latina chancellor of a community college district in Southern California upon assuming office in August. As the chief executive officer, Rodriguez will manage a budget of \$200 million and 1,000 faculty and staff members. She is known for increasing student enrollment, advocating for institutional innovation, and supporting professional development. "Serving as the next chancellor is the honor of a lifetime," Rodriguez said of her new role. "My passion for this work comes from my own story. As I walk across our district and our campuses, I see myself in our students. I am second-generation Mexican-American, first in my family to go to college, and a very proud community college graduate," she said.



Class of 2021 Graduated in Virtual Commencement Ceremony

On May 26, San Bernardino Valley College celebrated its graduating class of 2021 in a virtual Commencement ceremony. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic and yearlong campus closure, an in-person event was converted to an online livestream, where graduates and their families were able to attend and interact with other graduates from the safety of their computer or smartphone. In total, 1,597 students received 2,672 degrees and certificates in the campus's second-ever virtual ceremony. The graduation event was a live video that progressed exactly like SBVC's traditional in-person ceremony, except it could be viewed remotely on the campus website, YouTube and Facebook. The event's dual keynote speaker for both SBVC and sister school Crafton Hills College was educator and author Dr. Margaret Hill. "With this distance learning, with this pandemic, you show you have the stamina to do what you need to do for you, your family, your friends," she said. "You have made us proud, and we love your endurance; keep on setting examples for others."





SBVC Focused on Stopping Anti-Asian American Hate

In response to the rise of attacks, harassment, and discrimination against the Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) community, the San Bernardino Community College District (SBCCD) SBVC faculty and staff members participated in training workshops on how to intervene and stop anti-AAPI harassment. The workshops helped to continue the campus efforts of increasing anti-racism endeavors.

SBVC Signed Articulation Agreement with Keck Graduate Institute

The Keck Graduate Institute (KGI) expanded its list of articulation agreements to 30 institutions including SBVC, helping prospective students make a seamless transition into programs within the School of Pharmacy and Health Sciences. Benefits include priority consideration for scholarships, expedited application review, fee waivers, and more.

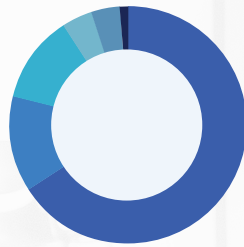
SBVC Recognized Latinx and Black Grads in Drive-Through Celebrations

STUDENT ETHNICITY



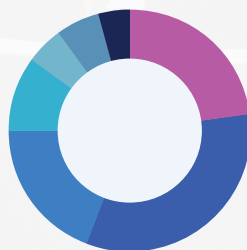

Child Development Center

This center is open to the community and SBVC students with children, and aims to provide high-quality child development experiences for infants up to 5 years old. The center is monitored by the CA State Department of Education and is subject to child care licensing regulations established by CA's Department of Social Services.

Library & Learning Support Services

The Library houses a collection of over 80,000 volumes that can be searched through an online catalog. One or more copies of most textbooks used are available for in-Library use through the "Textbook Bank." The Library also houses an open computer laboratory, with over 100 personal computers. Virtual Library services include meeting with a librarian via Zoom, digital reference desks, or accessing a wide variety of online databases.

Financial Aid

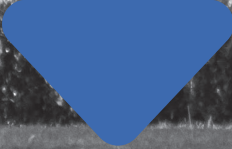
San Bernardino Valley College offers a full array of financial aid programs, grants, work-study, and scholarships to full-time and part-time students. The SBVC Financial Aid Office is committed to helping students with limited resources meet their educational expenses. This year, SBVC disbursed over \$32.9 million in financial aid to students, and awarded \$161,000 in scholarships, with more than \$10 million in additional emergency pandemic funding for students.

General Counseling

The SBVC Counseling department provides essential support services to a diverse student population by offering an array of programs, classes and counseling services. These include academic, career, transfer, and online counseling. Services are available to new and continuing students, returning and former students, international students, veterans, and working adults re-entering college.

Student Success

Student success is at the core of why San Bernardino Valley College exists. We are here to help students succeed in attaining their educational goals, whether in the pursuit of a career certificate, an associate degree, or to transfer to a bachelor's degree program. The Student Services division provides a variety of developmental & support services that work outside the classroom to give students additional assistance so that they can continue to concentrate on their studies. Our assessment center tests incoming students on their English, math and reading skill levels. SBVC offers orientation sessions so that incoming students know what to expect with campus culture, financial aid, choosing courses, parking permits, bus schedules, & more!



Transfer & Career Services

This center assists students with a smooth transition to university life with counseling services and information. Transfer counselors are available to assist students in developing educational plans specifically designed to meet transfer goals. Special events include transfer and college fairs, field trips to different universities around the country, and various workshops to assist students with informational and application needs.

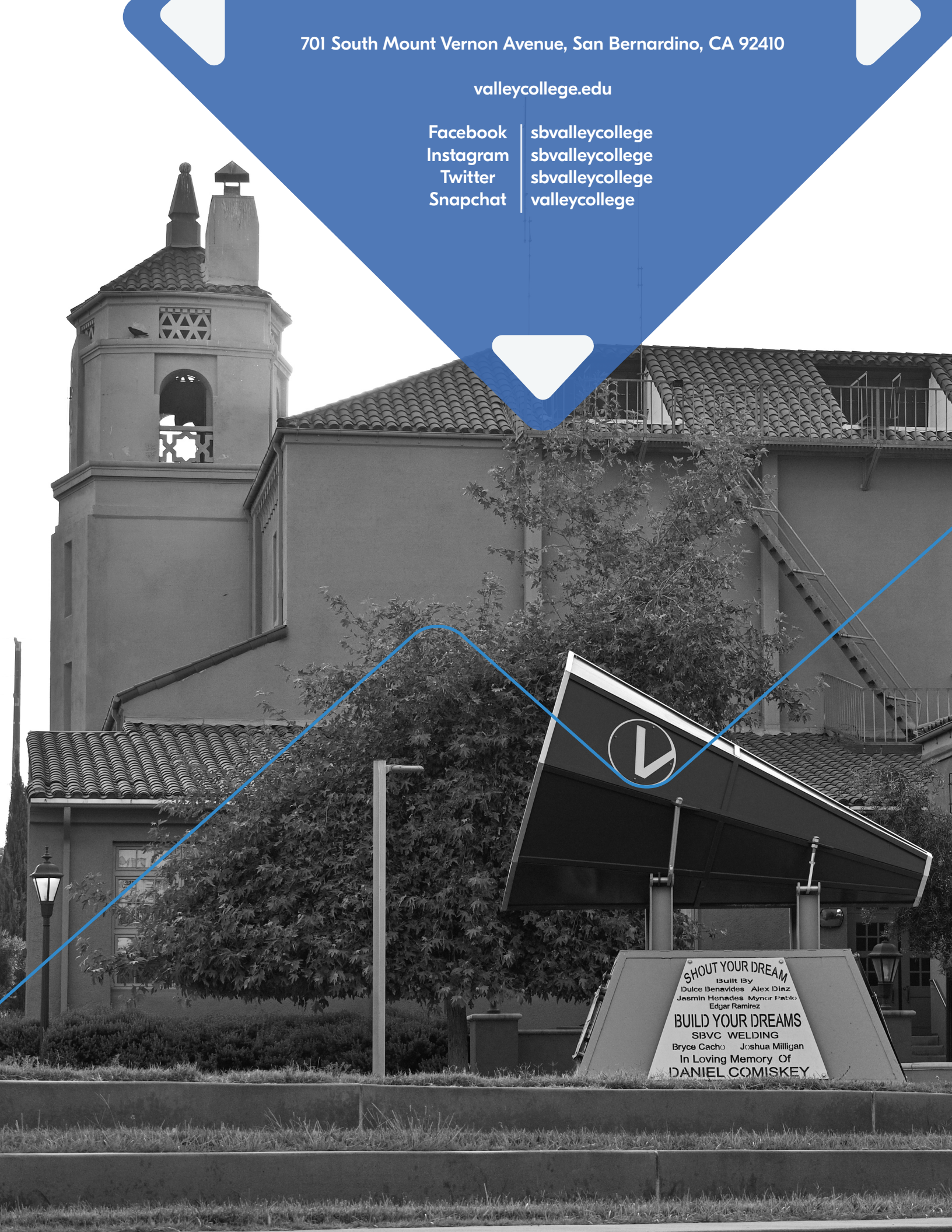
San Bernardino Valley College Foundation
