California General Education Transfer Curriculum

Starting fall 2025, the California General Education Transfer Curriculum (Cal-GETC) replaces IGETC and CSU-GE Breadth as the single lower-division general education (GE) pathway for students transferring to the California State University (CSU) and University of California (UC) systems (AB 928-Berman, 2021). Cal-GETC certification is required for students pursuing an Associate Degree for Transfer (ADT).

Note: Students planning to transfer with a Science, Technology, Engineering or Math (STEM) major are advised to work closely with a SBVC Counselor to determine the appropriate combination of GE and lower-division major preparation courses needed for a successful transfer.

CSU and **UC** Admission Requirements

Completion of Cal-GETC is not an admission requirement, or an admission guarantee for transfer to a CSU or UC. To obtain more info:

Note: students who initially enrolled at a UC campus, then leave and attend SBVC and plan to return to that UC campus (readmits) cannot use Cal-GETC to meet their transfer requirements.

Cal-GETC Certification

- Students may receive full certification only.
- Courses must be passed with a minimum grade of "C".
- Courses are certified beginning the year they are approved and remain certified until officially removed.
- SBVC certifies transfer coursework based on each course's Cal-GETC approval status at the originating campus.
- Official transcripts from high school and other colleges and universities must be on file at the SBVC Admissions and Records Office.

Credit by External Examinations

- Advanced Placement (AP) Exams and International Baccalaureate (IB)
 Exams can be used to satisfy Cal-GETC subject areas where applicable.
 Refer to the SBVC Catalog charts for more information.
- CLEP cannot be used for Cal-GETC.

Catalog Rights

Catalog Rights at San Bernardino Valley College (SBVC) are determined by the first term a student registers for courses at SBVC and/or Crafton Hills College (CHC), including courses offered through dual enrollment. Catalog rights remain with a student as long as they maintain continuous enrollment. A student may choose to fulfill graduation requirements from any academic year for which continuous enrollment is met.

Understanding Continuous Enrollment:

- Continuous enrollment is defined as enrolling in at least one course during each academic year at SBVC and/or CHC, including courses offered through dual enrollment (Fall, Spring, Summer).
- Any academic record symbol (A, B, C, D, F, CR, NC, P, NP, I, IP, EW, FW, or W)
 counts as enrollment.
