

**To earn a local associate degree and graduate from SBVC, students must complete the general education (GE) requirements outlined below, fulfill all lower-division major coursework, earn a minimum of 60 degree-applicable units, and maintain a cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 2.0, in accordance with Title 5, Section 55062. See the summary below for additional details.**

### SBVC General Education Requirements

Students must complete the following requirements:

1. SDEV 001- is required of all students taking nine (9) or more units per semester. This course must be completed within a student's first two semesters of coursework.
  - o Exempt from this requirement upon completion of 30+ units of college credit or AA/AS degree or BA/BS degree.
  - o Career-track students with vocational disciplines, which have articulated programs with four-year colleges or universities, apply for an exemption through the Department Chair or Division Dean of the area of study.
2. Complete a minimum of 60 degree-applicable semester units of lower division coursework, including at least 12-degree applicable semester units in residence at San Bernardino Community College District.
3. Earn a minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.0 in the degree-applicable courses. **Note:** To meet graduation requirements, students must earn a grade of C or higher in both English C1000/C1000H (or equivalent course) and in a Mathematics course that satisfies Area 2 of the SBVC local GE/Graduation requirements.
4. Complete coursework for an AA or an AS major as listed in Part IV of the San Bernardino Valley College Catalog. **Note:** Satisfactory completion of each course counted toward the major or area of emphasis requirement with a grade of "C" or better, or of "P" if the course is taken on a "pass-no pass" basis

### IMPORTANT GRADUATION INFORMATION

1. A single course cannot be used in more than one general education area, even if the course is approved in multiple general education areas. Consult with a counselor for more information.
  2. Students may receive credit for knowledge or skills acquired through a district's procedures for awarding credit for prior learning.
  3. Courses that meet or exceed the standards of the California Community Colleges completed at other institutionally accredited institutions shall be counted toward associate degree unit requirements.
  4. Students who have been awarded a bachelor's degree from an institutionally accredited institution shall be deemed to have fulfilled the general education course requirements for the associate degree; however, students who intend to transfer shall be advised of limitations transfer institutions may place on the transferability of credits, based on institutional accreditation, course modality, and any other relevant factors.
  5. Students file a graduation and/or certificate application at the A&R Office, AD/SS 100. An education plan or graduation check must be attached to the graduation/certificate application. Check the school calendar in the Schedule of Classes or the college catalog for deadline filing dates.
  6. Official transcripts from other colleges must be on file in the A&R Office. Students must request an evaluation to determine if courses meet SBVC GE requirements.
  7. In order for course work completed at other colleges to be applied toward a major, a Modification of Major form must be approved.
- \*\* Catalog Rights at San Bernardino Valley College (SBVC)** are determined by the first term a student registers for courses at SBVC and/or Crafton Hills College (CHC), including courses offered through dual enrollment. Catalog rights remain with a student as long as they maintain continuous enrollment. A student may choose to fulfill graduation requirements from any academic year for which continuous enrollment is met.

Understanding Continuous Enrollment:

- Continuous enrollment is defined as enrolling in at least one course during each academic year at SBVC and/or CHC, including courses offered through dual enrollment (Fall, Spring, Summer).
- Any academic record symbol (A, B, C, D, F, CR, NC, P, NP, I, IP, EW, FW, or W) counts as enrollment.
