> The Music Department performed multiple concerts and recitals during the fall and spring semesters. These included a Black History Month Concert, performance at Veteran's events, commencement, and the district holiday open house.

Local K-12 students were invited to performances of Amahl and the Night Visitors, performed by the Music Department's Opera Class during the fall semester.

The Gresham Art Gallery hosted 8 shows, demonstrating a wide variety of art, with a reception for each. Additionally, some of the artists served as guest speakers.

The Communication Studies Department, in partnership with Hunt Elementary School, The department faculty work with 4<sup>th</sup> grade students to improve their public speaking skills.

The 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual SBVC Film Festival took place in May. Student film projects from area high schools, community colleges and universities were viewed. Winners were awarded prizes that included scholarships for further study and film-making software.

		The communication studies department hosted its annual SBVC/CHC speech tournament during the fall semester. Additionally, it instituted an annual debate tournament during the spring semester.
		The Arrowhead News moved to an online format and has steadily increased its readership over the 12-13 academic year.

Departments reviewed their offerings, and projected a two-year schedule which would provide students a pathway to completion of degrees and certificates.

English increased the number of ENGL 102 sections to meet high demand for sections.

Reading offered an experimental course (READ 951) which offered an accelerated route to ENGL 914. Preliminary data is good.

Reading developed READ 915 to better meet the needs of the ESL student population. This course will be offered Fall, 2014

Faculty in both Reading and English have worked through the HACU grant, and the Basic Skills Committee to create learning communities that support basic skills development in the context of majors prep courses including Human Services, Chemistry and Biology

English has worked with the institutional research department to collect data regarding cut scores used for matriculation. This data will be analyzed during Fall, 2014.

Through dialogue with the Instruction Office, one section of non-credit ESL will again be offered during Fall, 2013 with ongoing discussion to occur regarding program growth. The Reading Department has begun to discuss the development of non-credit curriculum to more adequately
