Conclusion/Plan for Improvement: Though it is expected that more difficult assignments have lower successful completion, there are some changes that might improve student performance: 1) Current examples drawn from literature might be supplemented by more basic, or even custom-written, examples. 2) Both the number of attempts and success rate might be helped by giving grades/points to assignments when initially turned in for feedback, instead of only fixing a grade in the final portfolio. 3) More difficult assignments might benefit from stepped, or one-piece-at-a-time, assignment structure. I do not suggest that we alter this SLO at this point as it is assessible and does in fact describe a key outcome. Overall, the current program/pedogogy for this SLO seems adequate.
