- We as a college can accomplish our objectives, discover new paths, build capacity
- We can fulfill our vision through grants
- Grants rarely fund the status quo, but they do fund the future

Why grants?

 Grant office began with Title V Cooperative in 2005

 Short-term directors 2005-2010; Current director assumed leadership in February 2010

 Open meetings and targeted efforts resulted in regular stream of funding starting July 2011

Background

- HACU-Walmart Student Success Initiative from July 2011-Dec 2012
- Mentored by Community College of Denver, focus on paired courses learning communities; \$100,000.

 HSI-STEM and Articulation program PASS GO Cooperative grant from October 2011-September 2016

 SBVC lead with CSUSB as partner; bring students from Basic Skills math to transfer in STEM fields; \$5,493,092.

Awards 2011 - 2012

- Chancellor's Office Career and Technical Education grants; \$50,000 each year for 2011 and 2012 (two allocations). Supports outreach to high schools for CTE.
- Chancellor's Office Middle College High School. Funded at \$85,000 for 2011-2012; possible renewal year-to-year. Supports a college-level counselor and professional development for MCHS students and staff.
- Chancellor's Office and Foundation for California Community Colleges co-funded Student Mental Health Program. Supports training, identification of at-risk students. \$248,191 for July 2012-May 2013

Awards 2011-2012 Continued

 National Science Foundation Advanced
 Technological Education Program for Bridging the
 Water Divide project. Supports new courses and
internships/partnerships. \$199,273 over three
years.

 Minority Science and Engineering Improvement Program. SBVC lead with UCR (research) and CSUSB (STEM teaching) as partners. \$689,727 over 3 years.

More grant awards 2011-2012

- National Science Foundation Scholarships
- Environmental Education (EPA)
- National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) Challenge Grant
 - Oral history, Native American Storytelling

Grants in Progress

- Sustainability
 - Required for most grants
 - Sometimes viewed as budget burden and to be avoided



Think differently - costs vs. benefits

Mindset Shift

GRANT-FUNDED PROJECTS

- Offer time to see what works
- Implements and staffs needed programs
- Costs zero or very little in first years
- Able to build institutional capacity, including experienced project directors
- Learn unexpected things with each project

 State apportionment exclusively funds programs, services

 Grants provide resources for key areas

 From minimal faculty, staff, and student involvement Faculty, staff, and students actively involved and supported in resource development projects

Cultural shift: then to now

- Grants have the power to change the culture in a new direction because they combine:
 - Clearly defined purpose and objectives
 - Resources to carry out the plan
 - Dedicated true believers who carry the project from plan to reality

Transformative Power

2005 – One major grant

 No grant development infrastructure

- 2012 Seven current grants and more in the queue
- Ongoing process of grant development and management

Planning for growth

 Now that we know we can do this, what are the next steps?

Grants Progress at SBVC

- Strategic plan describes how we want to move college, disciplines, and faculty forward – what are key areas?
- Select grant opportunities to fund our priorities
 - Identify multiple sources to fit priorities
 - Develop a step or phased approach (what to do in Year 1, Year 2, Year 3, etc.)

Select strategic directions

- Leverage success what do we do well?
- Identify gaps what do we still need?
- Identify opportunities to innovate within ourselves and within the trends


